

ELIOT-PEARSON BUILDING FUND



Every day we have reason to wish for more space here at the Department. We watch the Eliot-Pearson Building Fund grow, and we are grateful to all of you who are helping, but sometimes — often — we long for dramatic progress.

It happened most recently when it became necessary to build an office in the Evelyn G. Pitcher Curriculum Resource Laboratory. It's a beautiful office, and it certainly was necessary, but it is heartbreaking to see the spacious Lab "chopped up." We have had to sacrifice a testing room to office space, also, and an observation room has become a seminar room. Let's stop this devastation!

In June the Eliot-Pearson Building Fund surged forward. The Eliot-Pearson faculty, wishing to honor our former Chairman, Dr. Evelyn G. Pitcher, when she became Professor Emeritus, had planned a large, formal dinner party. This would have been a pleasant occasion, but it would have been expensive for those who attended. It was Dr. Pitcher, herself, who suggested that a much more meaningful tribute would come in the form of gifts to the Building Fund. All alumni received notice of this suggestion, and many responded to the appeal in tribute to Dr. Pitcher. From June first to early November — at this writing — the Fund has increased by well over \$9,000. Dr. Pitcher has personally acknowledged every gift explicitly made in her honor.

During the fund-raising effort to rebuild the Children's School, we raised \$24,600. We now find, however, that that did not quite finish the job. Some of the changes that were made in the Children's School, when it was reconstructed, were not covered by any of the sources applied to the rebuilding, i.e. insurance, casualty reserve, plant reserve, Eliot-Pearson Fire Fund. The project actually cost \$6,068 more than had been anticipated. Therefore it has been necessary to authorize the transfer of this amount from the Eliot-Pearson Building fund to cover the additional cost of rebuilding the Children's School.

As this is written, almost exactly one year after the Eliot-Pearson Building Fund was launched (and with the above transfer taken into account) we have \$91,000 in the Eliot-Pearson Building Fund. The list of contributors continues to grow. The Eliot-Pearson Alumni Association recently voted to give \$700 to this effort. Individual alumni, notably Jan Fowle McLanahan, R60, Liz Mirkin Hawthorn R65, and John Kyle R67, have volunteered to solicit members of their respective classes or people in their respective areas.

But the goal has not yet been reached. In order to build the facility which we have planned and which we desperately need, we must have \$225,000. Is *your* name on the list of donors, many of whom have given more than once? Please help!

ALUMNI DAY, 1980

A larger than usual number of alumni attended the annual meeting of the Eliot-Pearson Alumni Association on May 24, 1980. No wonder! The program for that day was a tribute to Miss L. Beatrice Spaulding, a beloved former teacher. In her nineties, Miss Spaulding is full of *joie de vivre* and retains her love of children and her happy memories of her teaching days. As part of the program, some of Miss Spaulding's former students — Mary Lou (Adams) Cabbage, Janet (Fowle) McLanahan, Nancy (Kelleher) Forrest, Rosemary (Todd) Clough, Priscilla (Barnard) Whittemore sang some of the songs that they learned when Miss Spaulding was here.

Another delightful part of the program was a creative movement demonstration by Rosemary Clough and a group of children whom she teaches. We found it fun to watch not only the children and Rosemary Clough's rapport with them but also the great pleasure on the faces of Miss Spaulding and the many alumni, students, and faculty who were there. The program was taped, and afterward Rosemary Clough presented a tape recorder to Miss Spaulding so that she could relive the memory of the day.

SEMINAR DAY, 1981

The program for Seminar Day has not been completely planned at this writing, *but the date is set — Saturday, April 4, 1981*. Write it at the end of your December calendar and transfer it when you're ready for 1981.

The featured speaker at the morning session will be Dr. Bernard Harleston. A psychologist and member of the Tufts faculty for many years, Dr. Harleston has, until recently, been Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Sciences here at Tufts. He has a dynamic, attractive personality and an excellent sense of humor. His popularity as a speaker is unparalleled. Dr. Harleston's lecture will have something to do with the general theme of the day, interracial/intercultural relationships in education.

The remainder of Seminar Day will follow the format that has been so successful in the past: coffee and registration, followed by a keynote speaker in the morning (Dr. Harleston), a luncheon, and workshops and/or panel discussions in the afternoon. The Committee, headed by Vice-President Faith Chase, is thinking of using the interracial/intercultural theme in the luncheon as well as in workshops or seminars on art, music, nutrition.

Last year, although Seminar Day was excellent, it was held so late in the year that people were busy with end-of-the-year activities, and the attendance was not as great as it had been in previous years. It will be earlier next year — APRIL 4, 1981.

ANNOUNCING THE NEW CHILD STUDY ASSOCIATION

Recently Child Study undergraduates and faculty members have joined forces in an effort to improve communications within the Child Study Department and with alumni. Some of the questions and concerns raised by the Association thus far include: the need for a comprehensive undergraduate student child study handbook, for a peer advising system, and for the evaluation of class scheduling and curriculum development. NEW FACULTY APPOINTMENTS

• Ellen Horvitz, who received her M.Ed. degree here at Eliot-Pearson in 1977, has an appointment, this year, as lecturer. She is a psychoeducational diagnostician at North Shore Children's Hospital, Salem, Massachusetts. At Eliot-Pearson, she teaches *The Exceptional Child* and, next semester, will teach the course, *Assessing Young Children with Special Needs*.

• Frances E. Kendall, Ph.D. joined our faculty as an assistant professor in September. Dr. Kendall earned her B.A. degree at the University of Denver, her M.S. at Bank Street College, and her Ph.D. at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, where she was Program Assistant in the Day Care Technical Assistance and Training System Project at the Frank Porter Graham Child Development Center. She has taught children, supervised student teachers, provided training and developed curriculum materials for day care centers. Her particular field of interest is teachers' racial attitudes in the education of young children.

• The new Director of the Eliot-Pearson Children's School is Nancy McCormick Rambusch, Ed.D. Dr. Rambusch holds a B.A. degree from the University of Toronto, an M.A. from Teachers College, Columbia

University, and the Ed.D. from University of Massachusetts. She has done post graduate work at the University of Paris and the University of Chicago. Her experience includes preschool and elementary teaching, college teaching, directing, supervising, consulting in various programs for children in private and public schools.

Dr. Rambusch replaces Mrs. Dorothea Marsden, who now directs the Early Intervention Program in Concord, Massachusetts. We are glad to say that "Dot" Marsden has visited the School and the Department several times, will continue to serve on the Martha H. Chandler Scholarship Committee, and plans to attend alumni events.

• Dr. Donald Wertlieb, who has been a lecturer in the Eliot-Pearson Department of Child Study, was appointed Assistant Professor this year. He holds a B.S. degree in Psychology from Tufts and earned a Master of Arts degree at the Eliot-Pearson Department, a Master of Arts in Psychology from Boston University, and a Ph.D. in Clinical and Community Psychology from Boston University.

• Another assistant professor in the Department is Maryanne Wolfe, Ed.D. Dr. Wolfe earned the B.A. degree at St. Mary's College/University of Notre Dame, the M.A. degree at Northwestern University, and the Ed.D. from Harvard University. She has also studied at the University of Vienna. Most recently, she has been an assistant professor of Psychology at Brandeis. Dr. Wolfe's major field of interest is learning disorders and dyslexia.




Retiring Director, Dorothea Marsden (rt.) "shows the ropes" to new Director, Nancy Rambusch.



AN EIGHT WEEK INSTITUTE

Wednesday, June 24 - Friday, August 14, 1981

**CS 130 TEACHING THE SPECIAL NEEDS
 PRESCHOOLER**



This full time program is the equivalent of two courses. It is designed for people who want to acquire experience with special needs preschoolers.

After a week-long orientation, students will participate five mornings per week in a community mental health and retardation center summer program. In-service training sessions and seminars on various aspects of working with young special needs children occupy four afternoons per week, Monday through Thursday. Students may also have limited opportunity for individual tutorial work with children or for family home visiting during the afternoons. Extensive supervision is an integral part of the program.

The children, ages two to six years, attending the program represent a full range of physical and behavioral disorders: mental retardation, communication disorders, cerebral palsy, developmental delay, emotional disturbance, and "high-risk" multi-problem family situations. The supervisory staff includes early childhood special educators, a pediatric physical therapist, and a speech and language therapist. Practicum students are placed as regular members of five classroom teams. Each team works with the same group of children throughout the summer, so that individuals may take on varying amounts of responsibility according to what they are ready for.

PREREQUISITES: An interest in young special needs children and willingness to make a full time eight-week commitment. A personal interview and consent of instructor are required.

Limit: 12 students

The program is housed in a Cambridge public school.

Hours: Monday - Thursday, 8:30-4:00, Friday, 8:30-1:00.

The institute cannot be combined with any other daytime work or study and must be taken for two courses.

Tuition: \$600.



FLORENCE EATON DAVIS

We regret to report the death, on August 18, 1980, of a loyal and generous alumna, Florence Eaton Davis R26. She graduated from Colby College in 1918 and from the Ruggles Street Nursery School and Training Center in 1926. After her graduation, she became Director of the Cambridge Nursery School.

In 1944 she married Dr. Hallowell Davis, Associate Professor of Physiology at Harvard Medical School. Dr. and Mrs. Davis moved to St. Louis, Missouri, in 1946 when Dr. Davis became Director of Research at Central Institute for the Deaf. Florence died quietly in her home at the age of 84.

Mrs. Davis had a life-long interest in music, particularly piano. She studied under Miss Beatrice Spaulding and later taught music at Ruggles Street. Indeed, it was she who introduced Miss Spaulding to Ruggles Street. When Dr. Davis asked us to provide him with some facts about the life of his late wife while she was at Ruggles Street, Miss Spaulding was one of the people we consulted.

It is interesting that we recently came across an article by Mrs. Davis about Miss Spaulding. We think it says good things about both of them.

"Beatrice Spaulding reminds me of two words — inspiration and devotion. We are all aware of her devotion to music, to children, to students, to her colleagues and to people in general. From that devotion has come endless inspiration to those who know her and have worked with her. She is a rare person who has inspired many of us far beyond what some of us, at least, would have believed possible.

"I feel honored to have been able to introduce Beatrice to the Ruggles Street Nursery School. Prior to becoming a nursery school teacher, I studied music with Beatrice, but decided that I would like to use my knowledge of music with little children, rather than engage in the more usual music teaching. Most opportunely, just at this time I came upon an article by Mrs. Pearson in the *Woman's Home Companion* describing the Ruggles Street Nursery School. Very shortly I was enrolled there and began my training.

"Sometime later, Miss Eliot asked me if I would teach nursery school music to students of the Nursery Training School. This was a challenge. While I was using music as a very vital part of the school program at the Cambridge Nursery School on Hillside Place, I had done no formal teaching of adults. However, as you know, one tries to do what Miss Eliot thinks you can do, and so for several years I shared with the students my experiences in music with the nursery school children.

"Beatrice, however, was still in the picture, as our friendship continued and she heard about the nursery school children and what we were doing with music. From the first she showed an eager interest. Her searching questions, generous comments and suggestions of imaginative material made her practically an unofficial consultant. She came to various schools to give talks to parents on ways to enrich a child's life with music. Also piano students found their way to her studio from our nursery school family, teachers, student teachers, children and parents of our children.

"It was therefore thoroughly logical for Miss Eliot to ask Beatrice to take over the music course for the students when I left Cambridge in 1932. There was actually no question of anyone else, and fortunately for all of us she consented. What had been at first an amateur sharing of experiences, she has carried on and developed into a most comprehensive course, with her wealth of knowledge and above all her limitless curiosity. She has always been alert for anything and everything that could make music more meaningful and joyful to little children, and inevitably to those of us who work with little children.

We are all fortunate to know Beatrice Spaulding.


