Professor Robert Hudec

(1935-2003)

This past spring, the Fletcher community lost a brilliant teacher, accomplished economist, and close friend. Professor Robert Hudec taught at The Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy from 2000 to 2003 and was one of the founding fathers of the study of international trade law. He left his mark on the international community as a leading scholar of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade and an influential analyst of the World Trade Organization. Professor Hudec was a mentor to many of us at The Fletcher School, and he will be deeply missed.

Senator Daniel Patrick Moynihan

(1927 - 2003)

The entire Tufts community suffered a deep loss with the recent passing of Senator Daniel Patrick Moynihan, an alumnus of both Tufts University and The Fletcher School, and one of the brightest stars on the American political horizon in the twentieth century. Moynihan served as a U.S. senator from New York for 24 years and was a senior official in four administrations, including postings as the U.S. ambassador to India and the United Nations. Senator Moynihan dedicated his life to improving social welfare in America; his passion and wit will be deeply missed.
