The Crisis in the CPA

There is a very important question needed an answer, which is; whether the NCP has genuine intention to implementing the CPA, and what dose it mean for the NCP if they genuinely implement the CPA. I thank the answer for the first question is if the CPA genuinely implemented and ended with a free and fair election the NCP will not get the majority which will allow them to continue governing Sudan unilaterally. Losing power means the dismantling of their grip on the security and the country economy and that itself might bring a end to the NCP and forced the Islamists to regroup might be under Dr Hassan Al Tarbi and give themselves new name as the usually do.

All the delaying tactics, which is used by the NCP, are for buying time, and the most likely scenario is finding excuses to delay the census and that means delaying the general election

One of the main elements of the CPA, which is being delayed, is the democratisation process that include the freedom of the press, amending the security and intelligent act and allowing other political parties and civil society organisations to work freely without intervention from the security organs.

Inside the SPLM

The recent infighting within SPLM, which ended with the dismissal of two former ministers Telar Deng and Aleu Ayieny, showed the rift within SPLM leadership is now become widely open. The two ministers are very influential within their consistencies Bar Al Gazal region and they might cause a lot off troubles for Salva Kiir if SPLM political bureau doesn't take speedy action to remedy this. The NCP might try to exploit that to deepen the rift within SPLM. And how that will play within SPLM ranks, the former state minister of interior Aleu has launched a fierce attack against SPLM leadership accusing them of transforming the movement from A national movement into an opportunist movement and that is a very serious accusation

Next steps

There is need to widen the ownership of the CPA, it must not be only own by the two parties to the agreement, all the Sudanese are stakeholders and must play a role in the implementation to it and most important the democratic transformation process. More support is needed to the civic movements in general and the civil society movement specifically. The collapse of the CPA will have a very serious affect on the whole Sudan .
