## FIRE-SAFE CIGARETTE LEGISLATION INTRODUCED

Migden introduces bill to require Igarettes sold in California to meet fire-safety standards

Sacramento, CA—Assemblywomen Migden inveiled legislation today (AB 2200) to require all cigarenes sold in California to meet basic cusumer safety standards to ensure that the products will not ignite household items such as matterses and upholstery. This legislation is the direct result of a fire in San Francisco that claimed the lives of five young children and a 42-year-old grandmother in the City's most deadly fire in over a decade. Tragically, eigenette fires are regular occurrences in the United States. So far this year, at least two more individuals in San Francisco have lost their lives in fires suspected to have been ignited by eigenettes. Nationwide, eigenettes are the leading cause of fire families. Over 1,000 Americans are killed, and thousands of others are seriously injured in eigenette related fires every year.

Since the December fire, Assemblywoman Migden learned that for years the tobacco industry has had the ability to alter eigerenes so they to not ignite household items like upholstered furniture, mattressee, and carpet. Studies have shown that simple design changes can make eigerettes fire-each by making them burn cooler, or report burn as long as regular eigerettes.

"Inexplicably, two of the most dangerous consumer items made in America, eigerettes and handguns, are the only two consumer items that are not subject to any sort of consumer safety standards," stated Migden. "Does it make sense to require teddy beans and pajamen be fire-safe, but not eigenettes? When was the last time you heard of steddy bear causing a three alarm fire?"

AB 2200 requires the State Fire Marshal to develop performance standards by June I, 1995 and for all digarettes sold in California to meet those standards by Jamany I, 2000. Similar legislation to AB 2200 was introduced in the state Legislation in 1980 by then Senator John Garamendi. That legislation passed the Senate, but we later defeated in the state Assembly. Since, that time, legislation introduced in Congress and efforts to change federal regulatory standards have also failed under severe pressure from robusce interest.

"This legislation is long overdue," said Migdel. "The robacco industry may never be able to design a cigarette that does not cause heart or lung disease, but they can and should design eigenettes that will not burn you to death."

AB 2200 is supported by the California Firefig sters' Association, the California Fire Chiefs' Association, the Trauma Foundation, and the Children's Advocacy Institute.
