Talking Points for New York

To expand healthcare to New Yorkers, the Governor and the legislator has chosen to increase tobacco excise taxes. Foolish to target a revenue stream that is and will continue to decrease. Tobacco taxes are not a sustainable revenue source that can cover the substantially increased healthcare costs for New York. Who's going to be taxed next?
