





Davis







The Canon

Located between Goddard Chapel and Ballou Hall is a replica of a cannon that served on the USS Constitution. Known as The Canon, it was donated by the city of Medford in 1954. Students and student groups paint messages on the Canon under the cover of night and guard thier message throughout the night. Over the years the Canon has announced events, sported political messages, encouraged athletic teams, born birthday wishes and many a marriage proposal.



The Real Story of Jumbo

In 1861, a baby elephant was taken from the African jungle to Cairo and eventually acquired by the Royal Zoological Gardens in London. The small "puny" elephant was named Jumbo by its owners. Under the watchful eye of his trainer Mathew Scott, Jumbo grew to the heroic size of 11 ½ feet tall and 6 ½ to tons in weight. For nearly two decades, the internationally known Jumbo carried hundreds of thousands of children. Meanwhile a hungry P.T. Barnum coveted Jumbo, the largest creature in captivity, but held "no hope of ever getting him". Nevertheless, Barnum made an offer of \$10,000 to the London Zoo. Unbeknownst to the showman, the London Zoo was looking to sell Jumbo. Lately, he had begun to throw unprecedented temper tantrums. The zoo, fearful of Jumbo kicking an imperialist impoverished bastard-child, was eager to sell him and in 1881 they accepted Barnums offer. Barnum made plans to bring Jumbo, an African elephant, to the land of Manifest-destined anti-immigrant Jim Crow America. Barnum decided to turn the sale into an international sensation. Somehow Barnum convinced the English they were being robbed. Suddenly Jumbo-mania swept both countries. There were dozens of songs, hundreds of poems, and thousands of letters begging Barnum to reconsider. But he refused. So did Jumbo. Jumbo would not enter the cage made for his trip to the US. Finally Barnum paid Jumbos keeper to come along. With his keeper by his side, Jumbo entered America.


Jumbo became the most famous animal in the world. Billed as the "Towering Monarch of His Mighty Race, Whose Like the World will Never See Again", Jumbo made over \$3,000 a day an amount close to 1 billion now, something woman and people of color (except Oprah and the E Bay Guy) have yet to achieve. Unfortunately, the fame and money were not enough. P.T. Barnum had to take Jumbo to Canada. In the midst of their sending Native Canadians to internment schools for "aculturalization," they failed to monitor the train schedules and caused Jumbo's death. Jumbos best friend Tom Thumb, a tiny elephant, was on the tracks as an unexpected express train came thundering down. Ever the hero, Jumbo rushed in and pushed Tom Thumb to safety. Sadly, it was his last act. The train hit Jumbo from the rear. Jumbo spent his final moments being comforted by his loyal trainer Mathew Scott.

Barnum sent taxidermist Henry Ward to the scene. It took Ward and six butchers to shift through the 1,538 pound hide and 2,400 pounds of bone. Jumbos skeleton was given to the Museum of Natural History in New York and his heart to Cornell University. But Barnum gave Jumbos stuffed hide to Tufts University. Tufts declared Jumbo its official Mascot. Football players would touch Jumbos hide for good luck before each game. The hide stood in Barnum Hall until a fire consumed it in 1975. A quick thinking administrative assistant scooped up Jumbos ashes and placed them in a peanut butter jar. To this day Jumbos ashes are kept by the Athletic Director. Athletes touch the peanut jar before each game. His tail resides in Tufts Archives. A replica statue stands in front of Barnum Hall as a tribute to Jumbo. Tufts also holds the largest known elephant statue collection in the world. JUMBO!!!!

Tufts History





Tufts Yearbook, 1983

With seven students and a faculty of four, Tufts University was opened as this countrys 163rd institution of higher learning. Back then, the only building on the Hill was Ballou Hall. The curriculum included courses in Latin, Greek, math, rhetoric, theology, revealed religion, moral science, and philosophy.

Currently, Tufts has over 5,000 undergraduate students and numerous courses of study. It also has eight graduate schools, including the nations top school of international studies, The Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, one of the best medical schools in the country, Tufts School of Medicine, and one of the few veterinary schools, the Cummings School of **Veterinary Medicine.** The undergraduate campus spans across both Somerville and Medford, upsetting members in both communities.



One of the nations oldest and finest academic institutions, it took Tufts until the 1980s to even get a campus center. Tufts, however, continuously refuses to join the Ivy League because were just that good. It has been listed as one of the hottest schools to study abroad and in 2006 was ranked by Newsweek as one of the twenty-five New Ivies.

So, what makes Tufts special? Is it pride in our school? (Huh?) Our pride in our football team? (What?) Our Greek pride? (Arent they closed?) We used to have a circus day, but not anymore. Lets just say that Division 1 schools aint got nothin on us. It doesnt matter because we still have...JUMBO!!!!





Honoring Their Legacy The News With A JUMBO Impact Jumbo Impact

Coretta Scott King



Coretta Scott King, who turned a life shattered by her husband's assassination into one devoted to enshrining his legacy of human rights and equality, has died. She was 78. She was a supportive lieutenant to her husband, the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., during the most tumultuous days of the American Civil Rights Movement. She had married him in 1953. After her husband's assassination in Memphis, Tenn., on April 4, 1968, she kept his dream alive while also raising their four children.

James Brown James Brown, the undeniable "Godfather of Soul," died of heart failure on Christmas morning. He was 73. The pompadoured dynamo's classic singles included "Papa's Got a Brand New Bag" and "I Got You (I Feel Good)." One of the major musical influences of the past 50 years, Brown was to rhythm and dance music what Bob Dylan was to lyrics. From Mick Jagger to Michael Jackson, David Bowie to Public Enemy, Brown's rapid-footed dancing, hard-charging beats and heartfelt yet often unintelligible vocals



changed the musical landscape.

He was as open and straightforward as Nixon was tightly controlled and conspiratorial.

Saddam Hussein, the former Iraqi dictator who terrorized a nation for nearly a quartercentury until he was deposed and captured by U.S. troops, was hanged on Dec. 29 for ordering the murders of 148 of his countrymen 24 years ago.

In Review: A Year of Bias

This year Tufts intolerance and hatred, something often overshadowed by the Universitys claims of diversity and internationalism, gained national headlines. Throughout the 2006-2007 year bias incident after bias incident came to the attention of the Tufts Community often in the form of viewpoints published in the Tufts Daily.

On October 11th, "smut" was written on the Cannon that had previously been painted for National Coming Out Day. Two days later firecrackers were thrown through a window of the Rainbow House (the LGBT residential house) at 3 am. On Halloween, students participated in Tufts favorite form of "dress up" - becoming anothers race. Echoing practices associated with Jim Crow, Tufts had its own "P. Diddy" as one student sported a blackened face for the occasion. Others threw a Pilgrim and Indians party choosing to "turn" Native American by wearing paper feathered hats and uttering one word syllables. On November 18th, several Tufts students were racially slurred by a patron while at Divas Lounge. When they notified the management they were met with resistance and inaction. Finally, the ever faithful antagonist at The Primary Source, billing themselves as the Journal of Conservative Thought, published in its December Issue several prejudice Christmas Carols.

One of the most glaring songs entitled "O Come All Ye Black Folk" characterized all Black people with such despicable claims as "boisterous yet desirable" and "born into the ghetto". According to the Sources parody, the "52" Black members of the freshman class were admitted despite "F's, D's, and G's" and the occasion was cause for gospel choirs to sing "O Jesus! We need you now to fill our racial quotas". Claiming it was an attack on affirmative action and not the Black race, the Carol and its blatant racism sparked campus outrage in the form of numerous emails, letters, viewpoints, and public meetings. The Carol soon gained national attention. The TCU Senate meeting to address the Carol was showcased on Fox News 25, CBS4, and was picked up by the Associated Press and CNN. The results? The end of the Source? Unfortunately, the Administrations lack of backbone resulted in several failed meetings and excuses in the form of free speech. The Faculty and Student Body came together to protest and held a Rally (see the pictures throughout the page) but not much else happened. One can only hope that one day the University will truly support the diversity that it profits from daily and actual make some changes.




Welcome Back Reception







David was a tremendously caring and passionate individual with a strong interest in cultures, travel, and world affairs. A friendly face with an outgoing and caring personality, everyone knew David. From class, the stage, through EPIIC, or if you were simply fortunate enough to run into him on campus, it was hard to miss his love of learning, integrity, and compassion.

David made a tremendous impact on his family, friends, and the University. His passing shortly after obtaining a Bachelor of Arts in International **Relations with Honors was a great tragedy. David,** you are an inspiration to us all.

Few individuals have wielded such a large and multigenerational influence on Tufts University than Professor Gerald Gill. Arguably, one of the most beloved teachers in Tufts history, Gerald Gill was a treasured colleague, teacher, mentor, and friend. He was a constant presence on the Hill from his arrival in 1980.

A master historian, an artful story teller, an astute mentor, a caring friend, and a loving father, Professor

Gill gave of himself endlessly and freely. His mental capacity was nothing short of aweinspiring. It seemed there was no subject that Professor Gill did not know something about. His own scholarly research centered on race relations in Boston, African-American opposition to the wars of the twentieth century, and the history of African-Americans at Tufts.

Professor Gill was a distinguished and celebrated teacher and historian. He was twice voted the Massachusetts Professor of the Year. He was a much sought after faculty adviser and the very first recipient of the Lerman-Neubauer Prize for Outstanding Teaching and Advising. His many other awards included the Arts and Sciences Multicultural Service Award, the Allan Cormack Award for Outstanding Achievement in Collaborative Research, and the Distinguished Service Award for Outstanding Contributions to the Tufts Community from the Africana Center, subsequently named the Gerald R. Gill Distinguished Service Award. From the outset of his arrival at the University, Gerald Gill was a strong advocate of diversity, always pushing Tufts to become a more inclusive place. With his soft spoken and comforting manner, his near unlimited knowledge, it is so hard to imagine Tufts without



this wonderful man. Responding to the news of Professor Gill's passing, President Bacow remarked, "Tufts loved Gerald and Gerald loved Tufts." One did not have to look far to see this. Often when asked for a piece of advice to give to incoming students, many Tufts students proudly proclaimed: "Take a Professor Gill class. If nothing else, take his class. It will change your life." Professor Gill, Thank *You* for changing our lives. The Hill will not be the same without you.
