Pousette-Dart Band Will Play Tufts

Debbie Kaiser, chairperson of the TCU Senate Services Committee, has revealed a Senate plan to sponsor and organize a Spring Fling weekend in May. The Fling, according to Kaiser and Ted Tye of the Student Activities Office, includes special activities or demonstrations of the participating registered student organizations, and the Senate's contribution would be an afternoon concert by the Pousette-Dart Band, with a warm-up by Willy Nininger.

The Services Committee will present a plan to FinCom on Thursday night requesting an allocation from this year's surplus funds, to fund the Pousette-Dart concert. The allocation request is expected to be in excess of \$3000. All major Registered Student Organizations have been requested to submit plans for their own contri-

butions to the Spring Fling.

Ted Tye has explained that the Pousette-Dart band is available, but that a contract cannot be signed until the proposal is approved of the Senate General Assembly meeting on March 23. The contract would include a clause rescheduling the concert to Sunday in case of rain, and moving the concert to Cohen if the rain continues throughout the weekend. Current plans call for the bands to perform on the lawn behind President Mayer's home.

Other groups, such as the Jackson Jills, the Beelzebubs, and the SPIRIT are planning activities, and the Dining Services have mentioned a willingness to transfer the end-of-the-year outdoor barbecue to one of the weekend days. Nonetheless, all solid organization is still in the planning stages.

CSL Recognizes MassPIRG

The Committee on Student Life voted unanimously to recognize MassPIRG as a student organization, and approved PIRG's mandatory refundable funding mechanism by a vote of nine to four with two abstentions at Monday night's meeting.

The CSL endorsement meets the last condition stipulated by President Jean Mayer as necessary for him to accept a Tufts PIRG Chapter and its funding mechanism. President Mayer's other condition was satisfied with the TCU Senate endorsement on February 19.

Tufts PIRG organizer Julie Rosen, speaking from a prepared text to the CSL meeting attended by more than twenty PIRG supporters, presented PIRG's arguments for acceptance of its funding plan. She said the plan would not take advantage of apathetic students, nor use coercion, because it provides for readily available and publicized refunds. She added that the use of the funding system would be unlikely to set a precedent for other organizations because any organization would probably be required to match PIRG's efforts in obtaining 2400 signatures on petitions as well as receiving Senate

and CSL support.

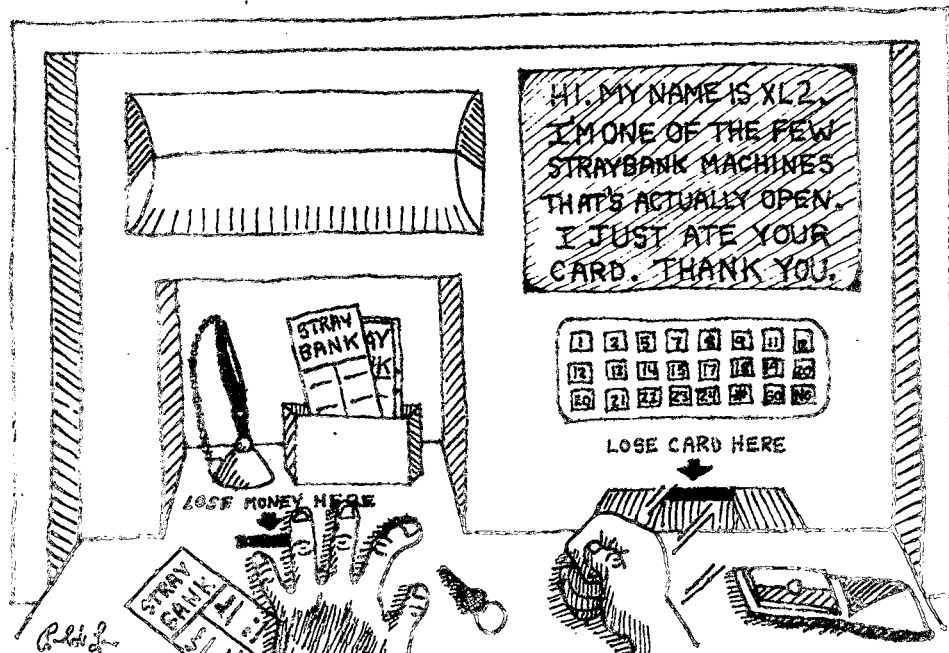
Ted Tye, Assistant Director of the Student Activities Office, criticized the mandatory refundable system for "putting the burden on those who want to get refunds" instead of those who want to contribute.

PIRG representatives answered that they could not solicit funds from contributors because "PIRG hires an outside staff which needs a stable source of funding." They added that a system which allowed students to voluntarily check off a \$6 contribution on the Bursar's bill would be opposed by the Trustees and perhaps by the Massachusetts PIRG board.

Tye, however, said of the system, "maybe the 'stable base' comes from those students who won't pick up their refunds."

Professor Sol Gittleman said he decided to support the mandatory refundable system and PIRG because, "it will be put in a fishbowl like no other organization," and will therefore be held accountable for its spending.

Tufts PIRG must now receive approval from the Board of Trustees for the inclusion of the mandatory refundable \$6 fee to appear with next year's tuition bills.

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It's Up To Mayer

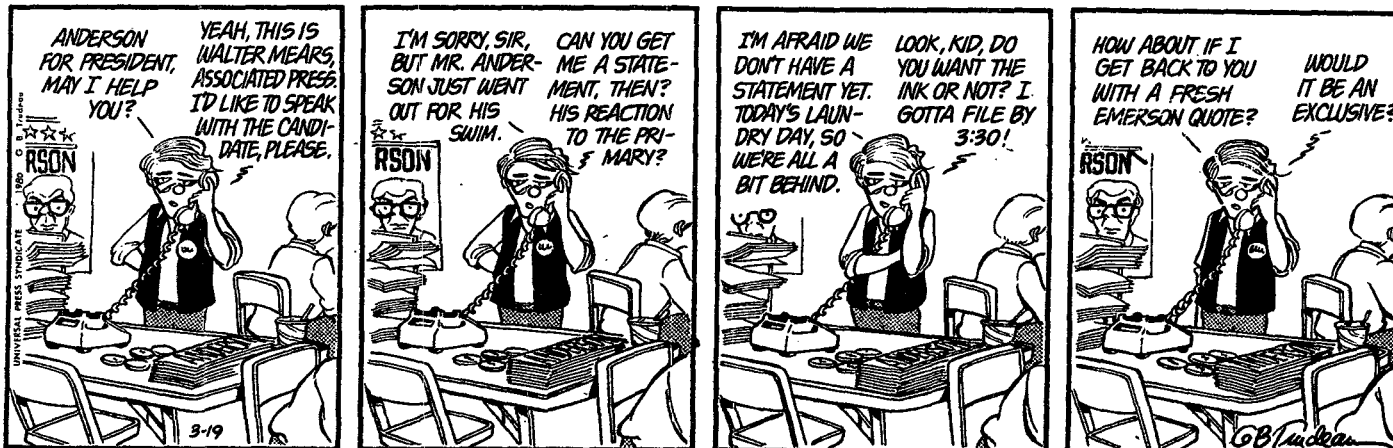
Tufts students should be aware that the Campus Center Project is again in jeopardy. While you may have made the construction of a campus center your top priority for improving the quality of student life at Tufts, President Mayer apparently has not. He has delayed the release of the Campus Center Committee Report to the trustees, in order to recheck its financial accuracy. This is not wrong in itself. However, if the President delays too long, the center proposal will not make the agenda of the April 2 trustee executive committee meeting, nor the full-board meeting in May. Since the board, who must ultimately approve the project, meets only three times a year, the center proposal could not be considered until late fall. This could mean a delay in breaking ground until at least the spring of next year.

When the delay came to light, the Senate admirably passed a resolution urging President Mayer to expedite the release of the report. The President should act in accordance with the needs of students, and release the report with all deliberate speed. If he hurries, the campus center will remain a live issue. If he dawdles, a bright hope of many will be temporarily suppressed and perhaps permanently so.

The student need for a campus center is unsailable, and Dr. Mayer should do all that he can to see this need fulfilled; not jeopardize it by needless delays.
