Photo Classes in the Dark

An apparent case of confusion and lack of communication came to light yesterday regarding the use of a basement classroom of Jackson Gymnasium. Until last week, the room was used for photography classes, though it was never designated as a "university classroom."

When it was designated as such on March 4, it fell under the safety and fire codes of Somerville. Subsequently, the photo classes' materials were removed, the back door which adjoined the room to the photography workroom and darkroom was locked, and its fire alarm mechanism re-activated.

Since last week photo classes have been held in the workroom, (a "frenzied circus because people are running in and out,") according to Photography Professor Siegfried Halus. Complaining about the predicament his classes are in, he stated, "it is an absurd circumstance with no consideration for the photography program."

However, according to Mary Sturtevant, curator of Jackson Gym, the room

has not been assigned to another class, and is accessible through a newly built corridor dividing the women's locker room.

She stated, "it's a bit of a hassle, and I appreciate that." Further, she said that the door was not locked on her initiative, that she received notification from the Registrar's office, and that Grounds and Buildings and the Safety office had inspected the rooms and decided the door should be locked and alarmed. She added that she sent out a memorandum to that effect one week before it was locked, to all those departments and personnel who would be affected.

The confusion may have been exacerbated because the memo stated that the room could no longer be used as a "workroom." Professor Halus uses the room as a classroom, and, in fact, according to Sturtevant, "there is no (scheduling) conflict, in terms of classes." She said her memo stated that the usual procedure of securing the classrooms through the registrar should be followed.

Mayer Discusses Future of A & S

President Jean Mayer said that he would like to "address the TCU Senate as a whole before the end of the semester" in an interview with the *Tufts Daily* on Monday.

The purpose of the discussion, the president said, would be to discuss student participation in the process of analyzing the structure of the College of Arts and Sciences and the Engineering School.

"There will be some student participation (in the process)," said Mayer, "though I am not sure what form it will be in."

According to the president, a committee will be formed to "study the undergraduate structure." Mayer cited a few pro-

campus.

"Nevertheless, I think it's a good idea to associate students with the committee," Mayer added, "it's a subject that undergraduates are bound to have a lot of ideas about."

Concerning Dean Harleston's replacement, the president said that he would like to choose an acting associate provost before the end of the semester.

"A department chairperson is preferable," Mayer said, "there are a number of people that I have in mind that I think would do a first rate job." Mayer declined to comment further as to who that choice might be.

On discussing the future relationship between Liberal Arts and Engineering, Mayer men-

blems in accomodating the March 16 TCU Senate resolution urging the president to include both faculty and students on the committee. "It is hard to get two or three students to represent the views of the entire undergraduate community," he said. Letter to the Editor

To the Editor:

Kevin Thurm's "On My Mind" column rather disappointingly perpetuates delusions which seem to be entering the popular mythology of the Tufts student body leadership. By publicizing such an analysis of the tuition problem, Mr. Thurm and the *Tufts Daily* are doing the community and especially the poorer students at Tufts a great disservice.

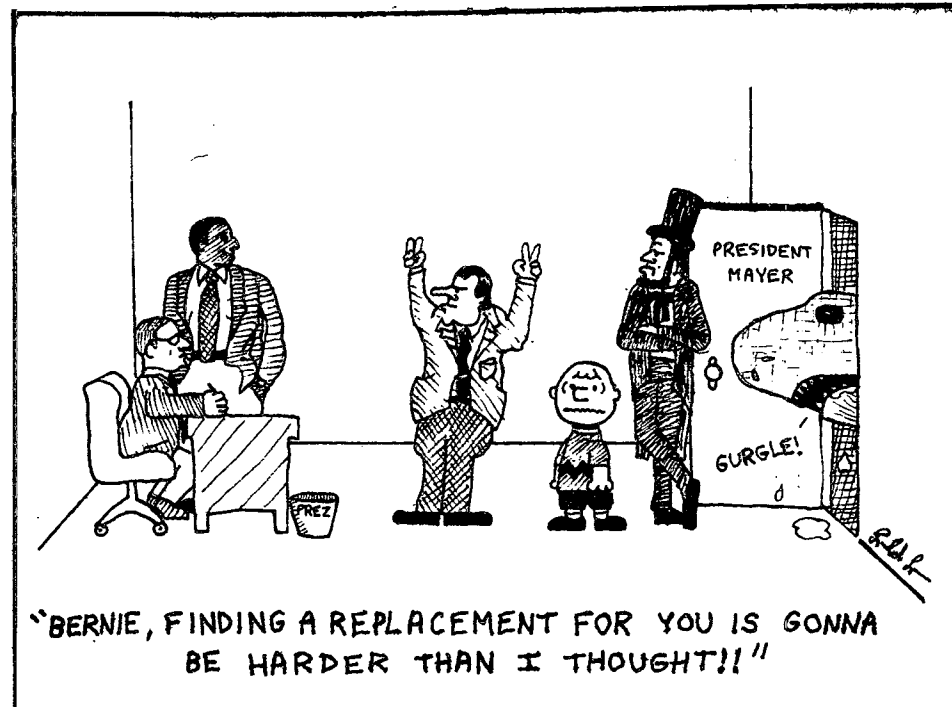
Are we actually to believe that class diversity exists at Tufts when students pay \$8000 per year in tuition but will suddenly vanish when we reach the \$9000 plateau? I would contend, reasonably enough, that those families who can pay \$8000 a year will not be suddenly tipped into the abyss of financial ruin by an extra thousand. Students on financial aid, however, may very well suffer as a result of the tuition increase, but it is these students who are harmed by the attitude espoused by Mr. Thurm.

Little evidence has accumulated to show that the middle class is a dying breed at Tufts. A recent local news report that showed a Tufts student transferring for financial

reasons was slightly unconvincing since the student was applying to Stanford, a school not noted for charging paltry fees. Nonetheless, the tuition protest led by the Senate (including Mr. Thurm) was directed at saving the vanishing middle class. The problem here is that the \$75 per student cut from the tuition bill is not likely to save many financially strapped students from transfer. The cut is actually no more than a refund to the majority of the opulent who staged the protest. Tufts is already dominated by rich upper and middle class students, and it always has been.

If the Senate had actually cared about poor students being priced out of Tufts, they would have advocated President Mayer's proposal to increase financial aid to students who need it. Instead, the Senate followed socially regressive policies, and obtained a price concession for the rich, while ignoring the poor. President Mayer need not establish a country club at Tufts because one already exists in the TCU Senate.

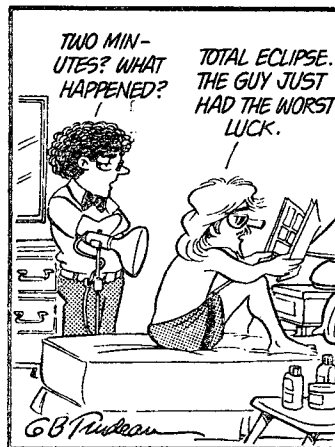
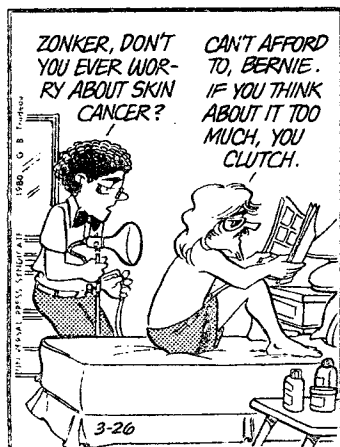
