Tufts Student Elected Office

Junior Frank Tortorella was elected Republican State Committeeman from the Somerville/Medford District on March 4th. The 21 year old Tortorella, a resident of Medford, became one of the youngest members elected to the 4 year position.

"I never thought I was going to win," said Tortorella of his victory over two Somerville residents, "I was really surprised and happy." Tortorella won by a 400-500 vote margin. There were approximately 3500 votes cast in the election.

"In a way, the party's still not over," said Tortorella of his victory celebration. "They kid around with me at Delta Upsilon." Delta Upsilon is the fraternity that both Tortorella brothers are members of.

The 80 seat committee's main function is to elect delegates for the Republican Presidential Convention this summer. There are two people—one man and one woman—elected from each of the forty districts in the state to the committee. At their monthly meetings' the committees other functions are to raise funds for Republicans in the state and recruit Republicans to run for various offices.

Tortorella replaces Ward Kramer in the Middlesex District two men's seat. Kramer did not run for re-election because he moved out of the district to Duxbury, Massachusetts.

Muddy Waters: Mannish Boy

You might not realize it, but all week long, at the Berklee Performance Center, the Boston Globe has been sponsoring a Jazz festival. Since last Friday, such renowned artists as Benny Goodman, Sonny Rollins and Freddie Hubbard have performed.

Last Tuesday night, Muddy Waters and Roomful of Blues performed at the Berklee, which hardly seemed appropriate for an urban blues concert. Instead of an unbearably hot and crowded smoke filled roadhouse complete with working class barroom regulars, last Tuesday's setting seemed too anti septic. There was carpeting, comfortable seating, ushers with jackets and ties and no smoking allowed. The crowd ranged from derelicts to debutants.

Roomful of Blues, a fresh new R&B band, which usually concentrates on Blues influenced Jazz, opened for Muddy Waters. They began with traditional jazz featuring their talented horn section. Ronnie Horvath, their new guitarist, moved the band into a series of blues numbers with a well received extended solo. Tenor sax player and singer Greg Piccolo's wailing sax on an instrumental version of Little Richard's "Tutti-Frutti" set the stage for the entrance of singer Lou Ann Barton who belted out three rockabilly numbers like a raunchy Phoebe Snow.

Muddy Waters opened with a classic version of "Hoochie-Coochie" and settled down to basic blues with such standards as "Trouble No More" and "Kansas City". At age 65, Muddy Waters proved he could still belt

out the blues with an ardent passion. The only sign of age was the stool that he sat on while he played. His adeptness at the slide guitar was still evident. He was backed by his regular band with Pine-top Perkins on the piano, Jerry Portnoy providing energetic harp solos, Bob Margolin playing lead guitar and Calvin Jones providing the fills. On his last number "Mannish Boy", Waters started to rock. For the first time he stood up and romped around the stage with newfound energy. After that song brought the crowd to an emotional peak, Waters came back for a powerful version of "Got My Mojo Working" while he danced around with Jerry Portnoy. Let's see Mick Jagger do that in thirty years.

The Jazz Festival ends Saturday with Eddie Palmieri.

VIEWPOINT: To Tell The Truth

Lying has become a way of life with most people. It's not that there is a great compulsion to consistently deceive, but there is a need not to encounter the bare truth-- which is oft times too much to think about and too much of a burden. Lying is the accepted way out of a difficult situation.

There are two forms of lying in common use: 1.) Out and out lying. this has absolutely nothing to do with the truth, indeed, it's the opposite side of the coin. 2.) "Little white lies". They contain some partial truth and some partial invention. A white lie is any kind of rationalizing, exaggeration, over-statement, under-statement, "packaging", good P.R., absurdism.

Most of us are taught that blatant lying is much worse than a "white lie." From the time we are weaned on Pinocchio, we are told that this kind of deceit is bad. Although our noses won't grow with each lie we tell, the idea is implanted that our character and integrity are at stake.

With so much emphasis on the overt falsehood, the lesser "white lie" is overlooked as a misdemeanor. A good example of this is John Connally's statement upon dropping out of the Presidential race: "It's for the good of the party and the good of the country." While what he said was no lie, it wasn't the whole truth either. He quit running for the good of John Connally. Why didn't he admit that he lost and not pompously rationalize his defeat? In this case, a small amount of bluster was more convenient than telling the truth. The situation was made to sound better by avoiding the central fact, which was that John Connally couldn't win.

The web becomes more tangled, though, as this kind of thinking easily becomes a crutch. It's one thing to make a statement which mollifies bad news, but the difficulty is when you actually believe it yourself. It is felt that you can always rationalize the problem to avoid the pain of truth. What originally was meant to avoid some embarrassment becomes inbred and the ability to face the truth is lost. Think about some conversations you've overheard: "I got killed on that exam because he didn't curve it at all," obscures the fact that you didn't do very well. "They're all such snobs" hides the true feeling of being snubbed.

What would happen if, for one week everyone told the truth? Not just to each other but also to themselves. Because people are not accustomed to looking at life without the capability of ducking difficult issues, being truthful could be difficult. Imagine the headline: "Ford says, "I want to be President so badly it hurts!". Or a friend would ask, "Why do you want to go to law school?" and you could smile and answer, "Because I want to make lots of mone". It might be fun, or it might be a disaster, but it would show to what extent people avoid the truth. For a week, it might be worthwhile to see what the truth really is.
