Senate Outlines Priorities For Coming Year

In its final meeting of the year, the TCU Senate was torn between an ambitious outlook on next year's objectives and some old nagging constitutional questions.

Chairman Phil Swain listed the restructuring of Arts & Sciences, the Campus Center, and oversight of

The Senate had voted three meetings earlier not to extend an apology to BIP, and Senator Danny Gelber questioned the constitutionality of an Executive Board that disregards the votes of the Senate. "It's the worst

the University budget as top priorities for next year. He also emphasized the need for a student representative on the Board of Trustees and a revamping of the Senate Finance Committee. "We have to take a hard look at how we allocate money to organizations," Swain said.

Kevin Thurm, Chairman of the Administration and Budget committee, also emphasized the financial picture. To minimize future tuition hikes, Thurm recommends that the Senate "scrutinize the university budget from day one so we don't get backed into a corner like we did this year."

But Senate harmony concerning next year's goals gave way to bitter disagreement on an old issue: the Blissful Ignorance Party's (BIP) protest of the last Senate election. The controversy surrounded a letter in last week's *Observer* stating ". . . the Executive

precedent you can possibly set," he said.

Swain and Parliamentarian Seth Godin, the signatories of the letter, claimed the apology was for inconveniences caused by ambiguities in election procedure, not for overturning old Senate rulings.

Gelber's resolution to "rebuke" the Executive Board's apology failed 12-11-1, one vote shy of the clear majority needed. The resolution emphasized the impropriety of the Executive Board making separate statements from the Senate as a whole.

Also, in a night of Constitutional questioning, last year's Parliamentarian, Steve Smoot, raised a provocative after-thought.

"The whole meeting was illegal," Smoot said. "According to Article 3 section 2 of the Constitution, this senate (the Swain administration) can't take power away until after May.

Developed Student Activities

"I feel very attached to Tufts . . . ninety percent of my time here has been rewarding but I know that personally it's time to move on," stated Steve Gesing announcing his resignation as Director of Student Activities at Tufts.

Gesing came to Tufts in November of 1976 and began to organize a then understaffed and inactive office.

Under Gesing's tenure, the office has expanded its role in aiding student organizations to organize and initiate events themselves. Gesing was the first full-time director of the office.

"I think the original job description stated there were sixty-five student organizations," stated Gesing, "I think that number has nearly tripled."

Gesing cites a "desire to find an avenue to grow and gain upward mobility," as a reason for his resignation. "Education is not that avenue," he added.

Gesing plans to begin some kind of entrepreneurial endeavor immediately after his resignation becomes effective; "Without a vacation," he commented.

Currently he is the owner of Plantfair, a campus oriented corporation

Cites Frustrations And Desire to Grow

Steve Gesing yesterday told the *Tufts Daily* that he had informed Dean of Students Bobbie Knable on Friday of his plans to resign from his position as Director of Student Activities. The resignation, he said, will be effective June 1.

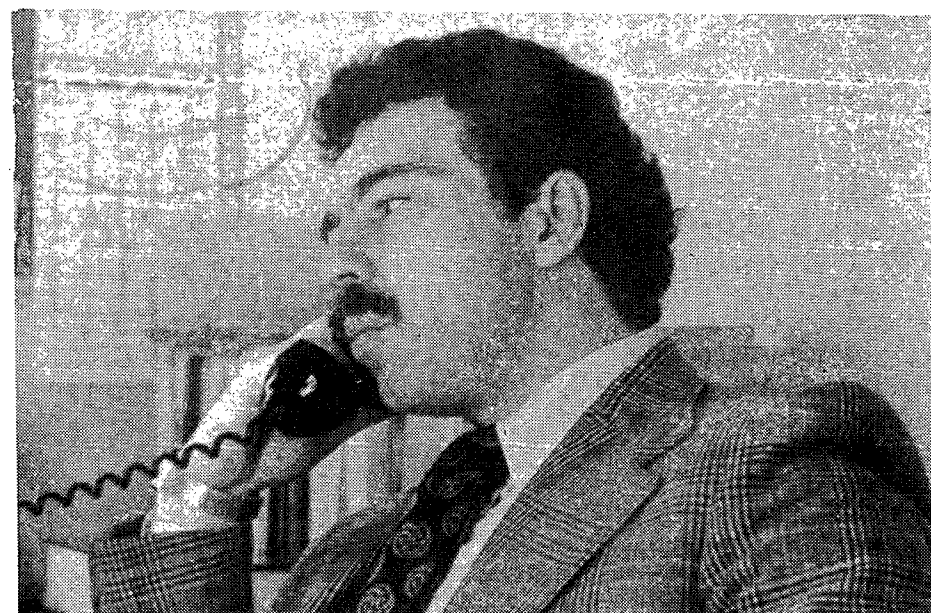
"The last 12-18 months have been very frustrating for me," Gesing said, citing the proposed campus center as an example. "It's not just frustration, though. I also feel that it's time for me to grow."

Gesing said that he plans on pursuing some entrepreneurial endeavors in the future. "I have my sights set on marketing and sales areas to utilize my skills," he added.

"I think that four years is a good amount of time one should expect to spend in this area," he commented. "Professionally, it's beginning to impede my growth, I don't think this is a long-term position."

Gesing said that he would like to see Assistant Director of Student Activities Ted Tye replace him as the director. "Ted is very capable," said Gesing. "He does the work of two people. Without him my frustration would have developed much

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Lane, Mirrors Close Out Pub Series

Robin Lane and the Chartbusters, recently signed with Warner Brothers, did just what they had promised to do - they rocked the pub.

Last Thursday night, the Pub Spring Concert Series ended with performances by Robin Lane and the Chartbusters and The Mirrors.

Robin Lane - clad in sweatshirt, Clash t-shirt, mid thigh wool skirt and a pair of black converse high tops - and her backup group played a satisfying hour and a half set.

Lane and the Chartbusters played most of their popular songs. "Why Do You Tell Lies?", "I Don't Want to Know," "Don't Wait Till Tomorrow," and, of course, their hit single, "When Things Go Wrong," were some of the better ones.

The Pub presented a predominantly New Wave program this year - The Stompers, The Neighborhoods, Robin Lane and the Chartbusters,

and The Mirrors.

The Mirrors, who opened Thursday night's show, were a surprise treat. Not only was the group unadvertised, but they were surprisingly better than any other opening band I've ever seen.

The Mirrors do some of their own stuff in a strict punk beat, while they do cover songs with close adherence to the originals. Easily one of the best songs of the night was The Mirrors' pulsating rendition of "White Rabbit," originally done by Jefferson Airplane. The lead singer (I wish I knew her name and number) belted out "Go Ask Alice/When She's Ten Feet Tall," as well as Grace Slick ever did.

The Mirrors did have some technical difficulties, but then again, doesn't every band have them? And they weren't bothersome enough to put a real damper on their performance. Even Robin Lane and the Chartbusters had their share of high pitch feedback.

earlier. There's no one better than Ted to take over my position."

Outlining some of the frustrations he has felt, Gesing pointed out that it took three years to get a full-time assistant.

Another frustration Gesing felt during his four years at Tufts was trying to get a full-time secretary for the office, which has only recently been approved. "The amount of work here is intense," said Gesing, "and we've been relying on part-time work-study help."

Gesing also cited the criticism he received for the four week vacation he took in the fall as an example of his frustrating experience at Tufts. "My vacation was justified," Gesing said. "The critical work for the full semester had already been completed. It (the criticism) was a bold slap in the face after a lot of unselfish time I had given to Tufts."

Gesing said that his primary frustration was getting programs and projects like the campus center passed. In addition, Gesing was told by the Dean of Students in 1976 that there was much potential for growth in his job. That is, to possibly become the chief administrator of a campus center, which they expected to be completed by 1980.

Despite his frustrations with Tufts, Gesing stated that he was pleased with the opportunity he has had to work at Tufts. "I feel that I have been able to take a great deal from the

University," he added.

"Philosophically and educationally it's been very rewarding."

"Bobbie Knable, (Assistant Dean of Students) Bruce Reitman (Dean of Faculty of Arts and Sciences), and Bernard Harleston have made

this a tremendous learning experience," he added, "They've all been extremely supportive." Commenting on Gesing's resignation, Knable stated, "He's been very dedicated to student interests. It's been good having him as an administrator, but I understand the choice that he's made."

Chairman of the Senate Phil Swain also expressed regret over Gesing's resignation. "On behalf of the senate, we're sorry to see Steve leave, he's been a great asset to the university. We'll miss him."

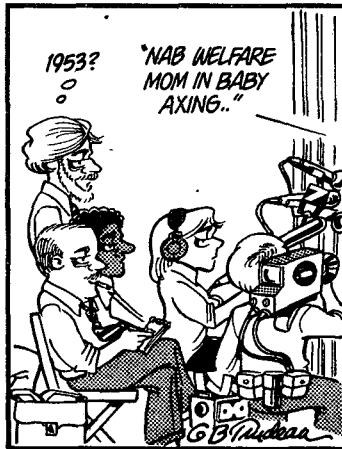
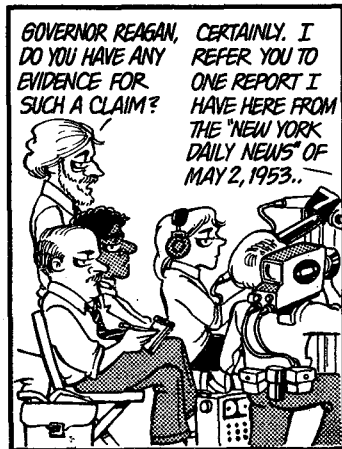
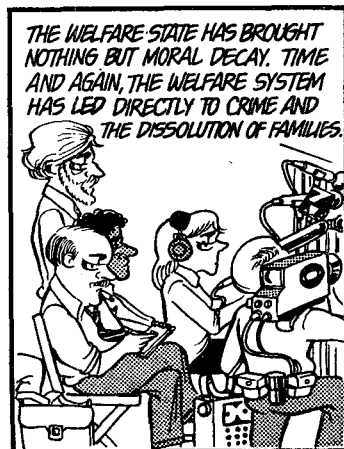
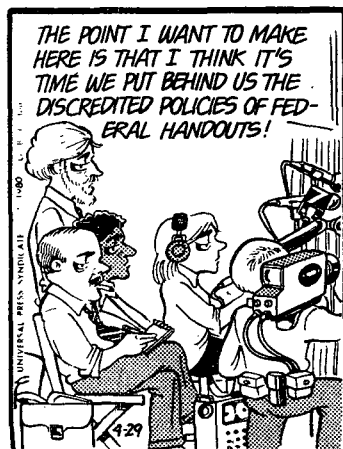
