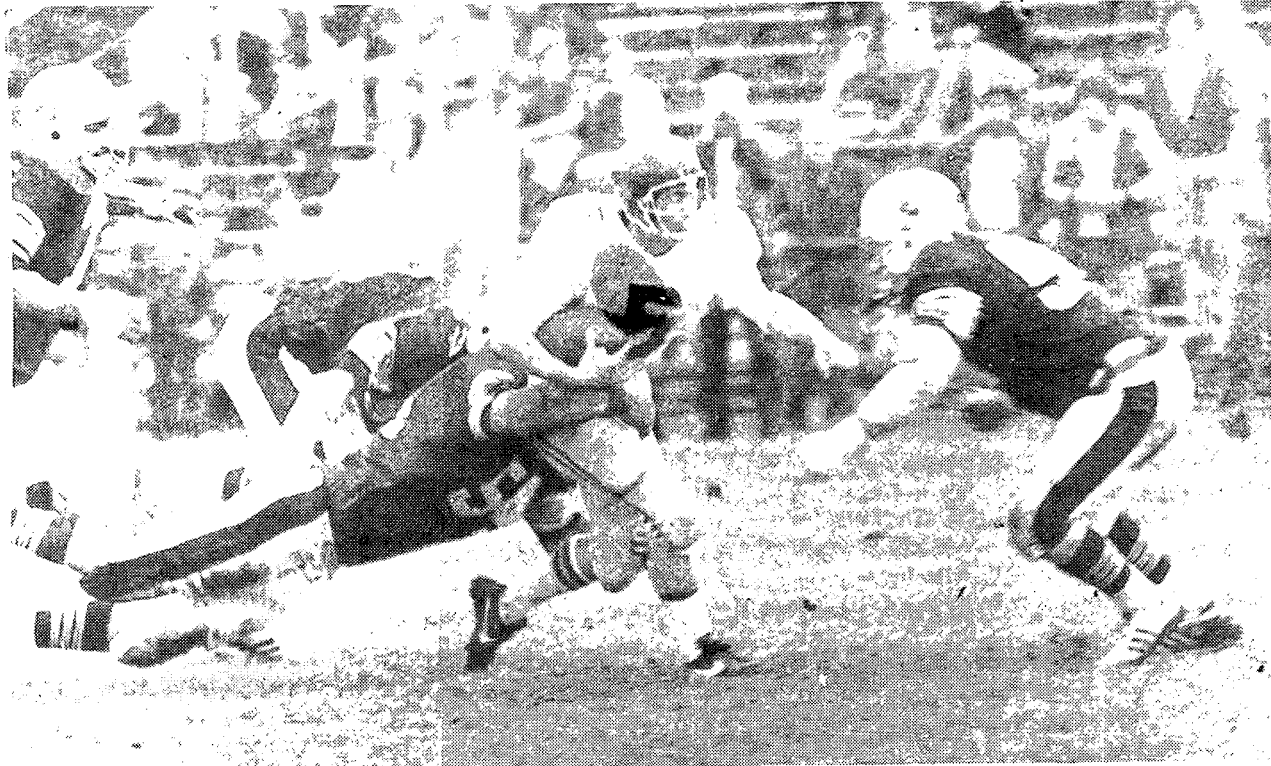
Jumbos Come Out On Top In A Defensive Game

Saturday's Homecoming football game certainly will not win honors for the most exciting game of 1980, but the Jumbo's played well enough to defeat Williams 14-8, and raise their record to 4-1 on the season. Slick field conditions and a fourth quarter downpour hampered the play of both squads.

Williams scored on their first possession of the afternoon on a six yard option run by quarterback John Lawler. Lawler's dash came after Bobby Finnegan's first punt of the day was blocked by Williams' John Kowalic. The Ephmen led only 6-0, however, as the ensuing extra point attempt foiled as a result of a high snap from center.

Williams' lead lasted only eight minutes longer

however. Steve Sogard aroused the crowd of over 8,000 by returning a punt from the Tufts 30 yard line to the Williams 38. Fullback Mike Krueger bullied ahead on runs of 10 and

6 yards, and finally scored on a 14 yard strike from quarterback Scott Carpenter. Mark Litner's extra point attempt was good, and the Jumbo's led for the remainder of the afternoon.

After having failed to capitalize on a Jay Wheatley fumble deep in Williams' territory, the Jumbos scored on a 14 yard scoot by Lenny Barber. Barber tallied his second touchdown of the year and amassed 58 yards on 13 carries. Litner's point after was good once again and Tufts led 14-6.

The second half was dominated by numerous turnovers and penalties on the part of both teams. Williams' tough defensive secondary stymied most of Carpenter's passing attempts

Small Fire at Nichols House

Campus police and Medford fire fighters responded to a small fire in the garage attic of 6-8 Capen Street on Friday afternoon. According to Police reports the fire was started by a local 11-year-old who was playing with a candle in the attic.

According to the report, a police cruiser was on the scene at 4:38, one minute after Nichols House residents reported flares in the adjacent garage. The fire department arrived at 4:40.

Letter to the Editor

Daily is Unfair to Carter/Mondale

To the Editor:

I feel obligated to comment on the article in last Friday's Tufts Daily concerning the Carter/Mondale campaign. Mr. Meynardie drew his article from our organizational meeting held three weeks ago, and if he had wished to accurately report the status of the Carter/Mondale organization, he should have double checked his "facts."

I am the first person to admit that there is a lack of enthusiasm in this year's presidential campaign, and I would not deny that the turnout for our first organizational meeting was small. I object to Mr. Meynardie's insinuation that President Carter has little support on campus. We did have a late start this fall, but since our first meeting, we have been building support and recognition for the Carter/Mondale campaign at Tufts.

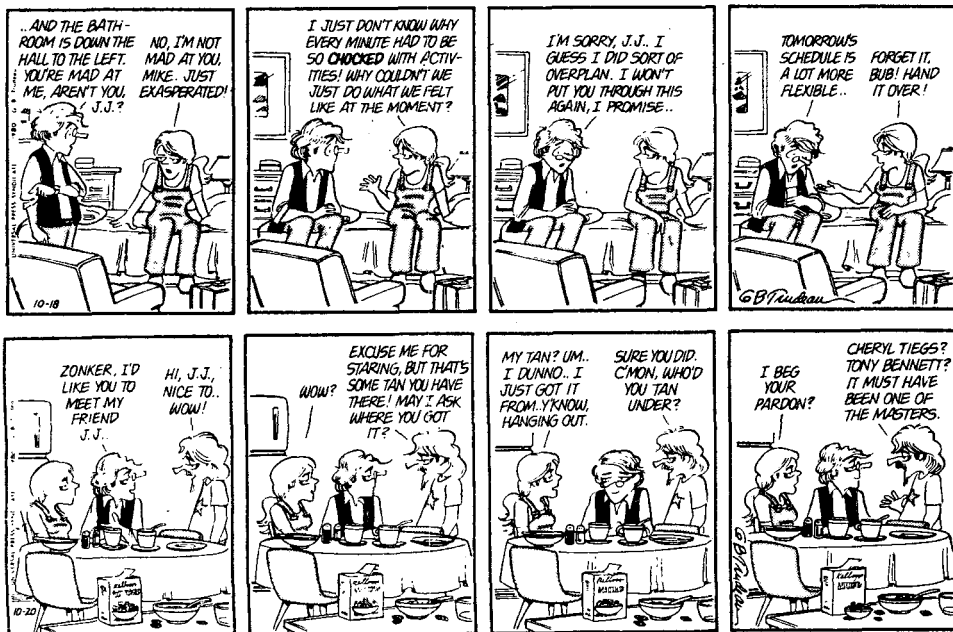
We now have a good number of volunteers, and are hoping to expand support for the Democratic ticket at Tufts, as well as send volunteers to help work in the Medford and Boston offices.

Our organization never intended to conduct a smear campaign against either Reagan or Anderson. We have not been "plastering the campus with propoganda" (unlike the Reagan bumper stickers which are defacing several buildings)-- our table at Eaton Lounge does provide information on Governor Reagan's and Representative Anderson's records, which can provide illumination to their beliefs--despite their current campaign rhetoric. We encourage people to come to our table in Eaton to discuss politics.

I also object to your quoting of my co-ordinator Peter Khoury, concerning

With 3:36 left in the ballgame, Williams had a fourth-and-one situation on the Tufts 15 yard line. The defense, led by tackle Steve Finnegan, dug down deep and thwarted the final Ephmen attack.

Williams' final two points came on a safety, as punter Bobby Finnegan ran into the end zone to end the game. Finnegan had another fine day, as he kicked a booming 75 yard punt for a tremendous 48.6 yard average.

The 1980 edition of Tufts University football certainly does not put excessive points on the scoreboard, but when the big plays are needed, someone always comes through. This Saturday the Jumbos travel to Amherst, Mass. in an attempt to up their unbeaten string of nine games on the road against traditionally tough Amherst College.
