Barnes and Noble Create "Flagship" Campus Bookstore

The Barnes and Noble organization spent all summer moving in and renovating the campus bookstore. Barnes and Noble manages many college bookstores along the Eastern coast with approximately 30 centered around the New York area. Included in their operations are the bookstores of Columbia University, Brandeis University, Johns Hopkins University, and Providence College.

Manager of the store, Scott Montgomery, commented, "I'm real happy here, everyone has been really receptive, they've made us feel welcome." The management has spent much effort and supplied more of their own funds than estimated to complete the project. New cash registers were put in; a wall was removed from the upstairs, and fresh coats of paint were rolled on all three floors. This year the clothing department was placed on the first floor because according to Montgomery, "last year there was nothing to make you feel you were at a Tufts bookstore" upon entering. Continuing he commented "If kids want a soda, or a candy bar, they can walk upstairs," pointing out the Barnes and Noble operation is "not a junk food store or a Seven-Eleven, but a campus bookstore."

The bookstore plans to be very responsive to student interests. "We don't believe in making people wait in line," Montgomery commented, also mentioning that on Wednesday, September 8, Barnes and Noble went out and rented four more cash registers. Addition-

ally, Barnes and Noble has hired baggers for each line, stayed open Saturdays for extended hours, and kept open as many registers as needed. The bookstore will stay open until seven Monday to Thursday on a trial basis, as the manager reported, "for as long as people shop." He feels this will give students a chance to grab after-dinner snacks or to do some late shopping.

Textbook sales have been running very smoothly. Barnes and Noble brought the textbook manager from the University of Hartford's bookstore to aid in organization. The bookstore regrets that they were unable to stock a large number of used books, but attributes this to the fact that they did not move onto the campus until after the Spring term. But for the Spring term this year, used books will be on sale. Students can get up to a 50% refund on most books they return to the store.

Some new things to be looking for from the bookstore are the Snoopy t-shirts long-sleeved t-shirts with "Tufts" printed up one sleeve, and the half-shirts. Also coming soon are sweaters with a jumbo elephant insignia to resemble the Ralph Lauren "Poic."

Manager Scott Montgomery feels that Tufts should have a great store, or as he puts it, "a flagship" in the Barnes and Noble fleet. Montgomery added that, "It seems that people really like the school...with the administration in tune to what students need." He concluded by saying, "We want to be a part of the campus and the community."

Support Group Forming for Children of Divorced Parents

According to Dr. Andrew Gauss of the Tufts Health Services, some Tufts students may find being the children of divorced or separated parents difficult to cope with. Therefore, Gauss is starting a discussion group for such students to talk about their feelings and anxieties.

"Several students on campus have experienced parental separation or divorce, explained, "Children of about ten may become more withdrawn, less social, trust adults less, and get in trouble at school. In an individual of about nineteen or twenty, these same problems may manifest themselves in other ways. They may feel resentment towards parents and adults in general, and may be unable to feel spontaneous and have fun.

They may also be questioning the idea of marriage and having children themself-

ves."

Not all who have gone through parental divorce feel the need for intense, individual therapy, said Gauss, but they may be interested in sharing information and ideas. "People are interested in reviewing these events and trying to understand them better."

Gauss has reported mixed results with past attempts to form the support group. His first group, formed two years ago, was a "success," but last year saw little response. Gauss' aim is to receive enough participation so as to create a permanent group; this permanency would foster security among the members by allowing them to get to know each other over a long period of time.

Gauss would like interested students to contact

Know Your Writes

In order to prevent any confusion or misunderstanding and to facilitate smooth production of the paper, The Tufts Daily would like to take this opportunity to remind students and faculty about our operating policies.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR - all letters to the Editor must be signed by the author of the letter. If a letter is written by a group of people or a campus organization, then signatures of every contributing author are required if their names are to appear with the letter. At least one name must be affixed to every letter. Letters will not be printed as signed by "The members of (a certain) organization." The telephone number of the author or at least one contributing author must be included. This number will not be printed in the paper but is required by the editorial board.

Letters will be printed at the discretion of the editorial board and depending upon space limitations. Once submitted, letters to the Editor become the property of **The Tufts Daily** and cannot be returned regardless of whether or not the letter appeared in the paper.

NOTICES - notices are printed free of charge as a public service to the Tufts community. Space limitations often dictate how often a notice will run, but without exception, a notice will be printed the day before the event. The deadline for insertion the following day is 2pm.

CLASSIFIEDS - the classified rate has been changed. Classifieds cost 50¢ per day for up to 35 words, and 25¢ per additional 10 words per day. The deadline for insertion the following day is 2pm. Classifieds must be pre-paid in our Curtis Hall office. Off-campus classifieds are charged at double the rates. Lost & Found and Rides Offered are free. Classifieds may run for a maximum of 3 days only, but may be renewed by filling out a new classified form after the first one expires.

Hinckley Speaks

Out

The man who shot President Reagan says America should "leave the insanity defense alone." In a letter to "Newsweek" magazine, John Hinckley Junior writes that abolishing the defense would be "A travesty of justice." Hinckley was found innocent last June of shooting Reagan by reason of insanity. Two days ago, Reagan said he's proposing changes in the laws that allow insanity to be used as a defense. But Hinckley writes that the laws shouldn't be changed, and that society should "Show some compassion for its disturbed outcasts."

Tropical Storms

Cause Damage, Deaths

Former tropical storm "Chris"--now a tropical depression-- is going out with a bang. The dying storm brought torrential rains and a tornado to Northeastern Louisiana yesterday, destroying a dozen houses and causing millions of dollars worth of damage. Authorities say the storm may do more damage inland than it did along the Gulf Coast, where it hit two days ago. So far, though, Chris has caused no injuries.

That's not the case with typhoon "Judy." That storm roared through central Japan yesterday, killing at least eleven people and injuring dozens more. Judy packed winds of up to 79 miles an hour, its rains triggering floods and huge landslides.

Cruise Ship Mystery

The Coast Guard will open a hearing today to find out why a cruise ship ran aground in Alaska Friday. One woman was killed and two other people injured in the scurry to evacuate the "Majestic Explorer" after it hit some rocks in Frederick Sound, southeast of Juneau. One Coast Guard Official has said "Personnel Error" may have caused the ship to run aground.

on Trial

Today's the release date for a report on allegations that Labor Secretary Raymond Donovan associated with organized crime figures before taking office. But special prosecutor, Leon Silverman won't say what conclusions he's come to, or even if his investigation is finished. Donovan has predicted he'll be cleared by the special prosecutor.

Tourism officials kicked off the "Guinness week of records today," Predicting that several offbeat titles will be claimed during the next few days. "Bernstein on Broadway" Pays Tribute to Master Composer

Few would argue that Leonard Bernstein is a genius. Not since Gershwin has there been a composer so firmly entrenched in both "serious" and "popular" music. Paying tribute to the latter field was Pen, Paint, and Pretzels' "Easy Assimilation: Bernstein on Broadway" performed September 9, 10, 11 at the Arena Theater. Playing like a greatest hits album, the cast of four (Alison Aguirre, Jason Lewis, Josh Tane, Fiona Wright) sang Bernstein favorites from eight of his musicals including the popular On the Town and West Side Story.

With original continuity by John Lowell, the 90-minute show held together well despite a weak first act and occasional lapses in vocal delivery. Bernstein's music, derived from sources

such as Stravinsky and Mahler, was performed with much skill by pianists John Lowell and Martin Fernandi.

Standing out in the cast was Alison Aguirre who shone in "I Can Cook Too" from On the Town, and "I Am Easily Assimilated" from Candide.

The choreography by Martin Fernandi, who also directed, was at times interesting ("God Said" from Mass), but more often not ("Never-land" from Peter Pan).

The show finished well with "Some Other Time" from On the Town in which the four-part vocal harmonizing was at its best. Although it displayed talent and at least honest potential, "Bernstein on Broadway", all too often, could be assimilated all too easily.

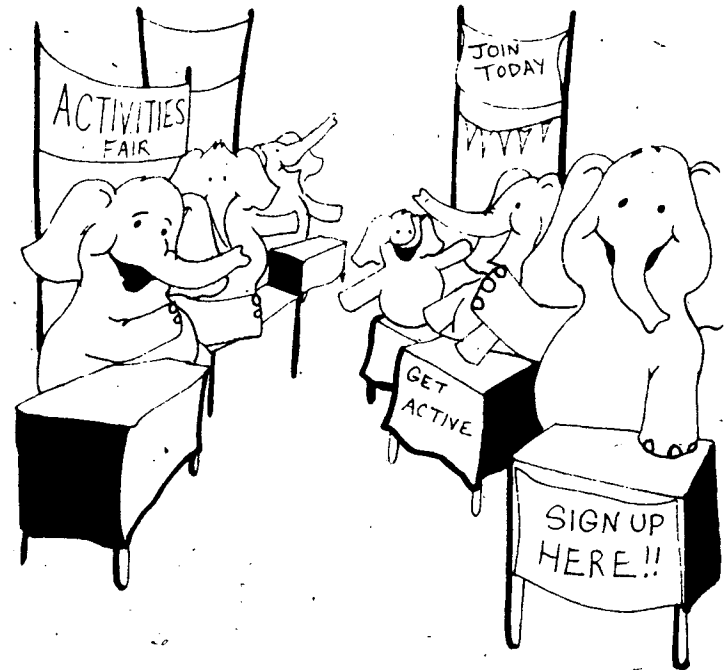

him by setting up an appointment with his secretary. He will interview each student individually to discuss their feelings about being in a group. The interview, the doctor added, is called a "screening interview" and is standard procedure for therapists forming groups.

Six to eight people is the ideal number for one group, said Gauss; but if the turnout is larger, his associate Dr. Fulton will

head another group.

Gauss emphasized that although he hopes to meet the needs of many students through the group process, some students experiencing difficulties with parental separation or divorce may not feel comfortable in a group. For them, individual counseling is available either at the Counseling Center or Health Services.

The Office of Undergraduate Admissions is seeking six students to give personal interviews on campus to secondary school students considering Tufts. 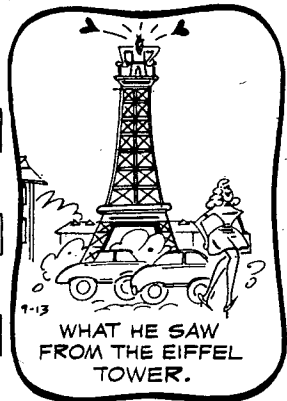
