FEDERAL COURTS.—Supreme Court

At the seat of government, the first Mondays of February and August, annually.

CIRCUIT COURTS.

Eastern Circuit.—In New-Hampshire, at Portsmouth on the 27th day of May, & at Exeter on the 24th day of October. In Massachusetts at Boston, on the 7th Day of June and 12th of October. In Rhode Island, at Newport on the 19th day of June, and at Providence, on the 7th of November. In Connecticut, at New-Haven, on the 25th day of April and at Hartford, on the 25th of September. In New-York, at New-York, on the 5th days of April and September. In Vermont, at Windsor and Bennington, alternately, beginning at the first, on the 12th day of May annually.

[ If any of the days should happen on Sunday, the session is to commence the day following, ]

Eastern District Courts.

In the District of New-Hampshire, District Courts are held, alternately, at Exeter and Portsmouth, on the third Tuesdays of March, June, September and December. In Massachusetts, alternately, at Boston and Salem, on the third Tuesday in March, the fourth Tuesday in June, the second Tuesday in September, and the first Tuesday in December. In Maine, at Portland and Pownalborough, alternately, on the first Tuesday of March, third Tuesday of June, and first Tuesdays of September & December. In Rhode Island, at Newport and Providence, on the first Mondays of February, May, August and November. In Connecticut, alternately at Hartford and New Haven on the third Tuesdays of February, May, August and November. In Vermont, at Windsor and Rutland, alternately, on the first Mondays of February, May, August and November.

County of Grafton. At Plymouth the first Tuesday in September, and December. At Haverhill, the first Tuesdays in March and June.

At Danbury, the last Tuesday save two in February. At New-Haven, the last Tuesdays save one in February and August. At Hartford, the first Tuesday in March and September. At Windham, the third Tuesdays in March and September. At New-London, the fourth Tuesday in September. At Norwich, the fourth Tuesday in March. At Litchfield, the first

Tuesday in February and August. At Middletown, the last Tuesday of July. At Haddam, the fourth Tuesday of April. At Tolland last Tuesday save one in January. Supreme Court of Errors at Hartford, on the Tuesday of the week next preceding the second Thursday in May. At New-Haven, on the Tuesday next preceding the second Thursday in October.

Inferior Courts in Rhod Island.

At Newport, the last Monday in May & third Monday in November. At Providence the third Monday in June and third Monday in December. At South-Kingston, the third Monday in February, and second Monday in August. At Bristol, the first Monday in January and July. At East-Greenwich, the third Mondays in January and July.

The Yearly Meetings of the Friends, commonly called Quakers.

**T**HE Yearly Meeting on Rhode Island beginning at Portsmouth, is on the 5th day before the 2d 6th day of the 6th month: Composed of three Quarterly Meetings, which go by the name of Rhode-Island, Salem & Sandwich. Rhode-Island Quarter is held on 5th day before the 2d 6th day of the first month, at Swanzy. In the 4th month at East-Greenwich. In the 7th at Smithfield, upper Meeting House. And in the 10th month at Dartmouth. Salem Quar. is held at Seabrook, (formerly Hampton) on the 7th day before the 4th 1st day of the 1st month. At Salem, the 1st 6th day of the 6th month. At Falmouth, on the 7th day before the fourth 1st day of the 9th month. And at Dover, the 7th day before the 4th 1st day in the 10th month. Sandwich Quarter is held at Falmouth, on the 2d 6th day in the 12th month. At Sandwich the 6th day before the last 1st day in the 3d month. At Nantucket, the 3d day after 4th 6th day in the 6th month. And at Loug Plain, the 7th day before the 2d 6th day in the 10th month.


