## Follett Makes Promises: Gets 5 Year Contract

The University has agreed to renew a five-year contract allowing Follett to continue private operation of the University Store. While the Inter-Dormitory Council (IDC) has voiced opposition to this, Dean Ladd has explained that "the decision has essentially already been made."

Before 1975, the University operated the bookstore at a loss approaching \$70,000 per year. Since then, the Administration has handed over operation of the University Store to Follett in return for a percentage of sales which last year equalled \$4000.

Dean Ladd feels that the University is presently getting good service from Follett, and that a return to a university-run bookstore would be costly. "It's indisputable that the first few years would be a loss," Ladd said because it takes time to learn how to run the store efficiently.

The IDC prefers a university-run store because they believe it will improve service and reduce prices. In response to this, Ladd explained, "we might pay less, but the efficiency and profitability wouldn't be there." In addition, under a university-run bookstore, the Tufts community would pay directly for any business losses. Presently, Follett maintains all financial liabilities.

Ted Witt, the present manager of the University

Store, has maintained the same price structure as the old university-run bookstore, but has succeeded in turning a profit for Follett. Part of the reason, he explains, is that Follett is a nationwide chain and they can save money with volume buying. "I have two bosses; Follett and Tufts," says Witt, which also may be responsible for the greater efficiency.

Both Ladd and Witt expressed disappointment with the limited student involvement in the University Store issue. "The interest runs wide, but not deep," says Ladd. Everybody is concerned, but very few students are willing to put in the concentrated effort needed to oversee the University store's operation.

Follett did agree to cooperate more with the faculty on book ordering, and to hire more students in the store. However, Dean Ladd points out, it's easy to extract promises from Follett. The question is whether they are going to live up to their commitments. "The campus Bookstore Committee is supposed to oversee the operation of the bookstore, but so far "student participation has been light," says Witt. In fact, when Dean Ladd and Dean Knable called a meeting of the bookstore Committee earlier this year it was a failure: no one showed up.

## Harleston Cites Reasons for Resignation

Dean of Arts and Sciences Bernard Harleston outlined his concerns about the future of the undergraduate experience at Tufts at the Senate meeting on Tuesday. These concerns sparked his resignation at the beginning of the month.

Harleston included the separation of the Engineering college and the college of Liberal Arts, the graduate schools' relationship with undergraduate schools, expansion and change at the university, and the Board of Trustees' involvement in daily affairs on campus as reasons for his resignation.

"The undergraduate education at Tufts is an unusual combination," said Harleston, "many schools have either an engineering school or a liberal arts school, but we have both." Harleston expressed concern about the possible separation of the two schools at Tufts. "The issue should be discussed as a student issue, not just as an administrative decision," remarked Harleston.

Dean Harleston, who officially resigned on March 11, effective August 31, expressed concern about the relationship of the

undergraduate schools with the university's graduate programs. "There is lots of talk about the graduate schools," said Harleston, "with little

Harleston also stressed the need for an academic vice-president. "The price we've paid for not having an academic vice-president is a large one," he said.

Harleston also doesn't want to see the undergraduate experience suffer as

## Fincom Announces Delayed Results

The Senate Financial Committee (FinCom) publicized budget recommendations for student organizations for the 1980-81 year yesterday with figures similar to last year's allotments.

*Appeals will be heard tonight. See Senate Treasurer to register.*

FinCom's recommendations were originally scheduled to be announced Friday following their Thursday night meeting. Debate over two new large budgets, however, led to an all-night meeting and the delay.

FinCom member Kevin Thurm said that the committee's decision was made more difficult by the addition of two large budgets, the *Tufts Daily* and the Programming Board. He added that FinCom members "are not omniscient" and that appeals on allotments would be heard by FinCom on Tuesday night.

Thurm said FinCom has deferred voting until appeals are finished on a proposal authorized at Sunday night's full Senate meeting to raise the student activities fee. He added that FinCom will

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## Prisoners Are People Too

The Billerica State House of Correction, in Billerica, Mass. is a small minimum security prison for men. The prison is not a dirty, rat-infested place inhabited by desperate victims of modern society. Rather, it looks like an ugly elementary school building, housing people much like students.

Many of the problems faced by the inmates at Billerica hinge on loneliness and a sense of isolation from society. Because people are often sentenced to prisons that are distant from their hometowns, many inmates do not have visitors on a regular basis. Some go for months without ever seeing their families and many lose touch with their relatives completely. Few inmates know exactly how much time they have to serve because of cases pending in court, and some inmates are subject to movements from one prison to another without any advanced warning. The sense of isolation and confusion that accompanies being cut off from society for an indefinite amount of time is increased by the fact that most inmates have nothing to do all day but eat and sleep and talk to other inmates. Because few inmates have jobs, Billerica is filled with able bodied men who have to sit around all day and wait.

And for what are they waiting? Without ties to the "outside" parole may become a meaningless step in a cycle of incarceration-freedom-incarceration. In this isolation, a person may find it increasingly difficult to establish and maintain a sense of worth it is easy to lose sight of human dignity. If a convict is to make a successful attempt at reentering society voluntarily and productively this damaging sense of aloneness must be combatted. The support of a friend, the touch of one's wife, the smile of one's child; these are the ties which reaffirm an inmate's humanness.

Wednesday nights, Tufts students are given the opportunity to make friends with people who need friends. Students talk with inmates over coffee, and these nights are characterized by laughs, smiles, serious talk, card games, tears, jokes and frustration. Gradually friendships are built, informally bridging the gap between inmate and volunteer. Alone, the Fellowship Program at Billerica is not enough, but it is a beginning.

To the Editor:

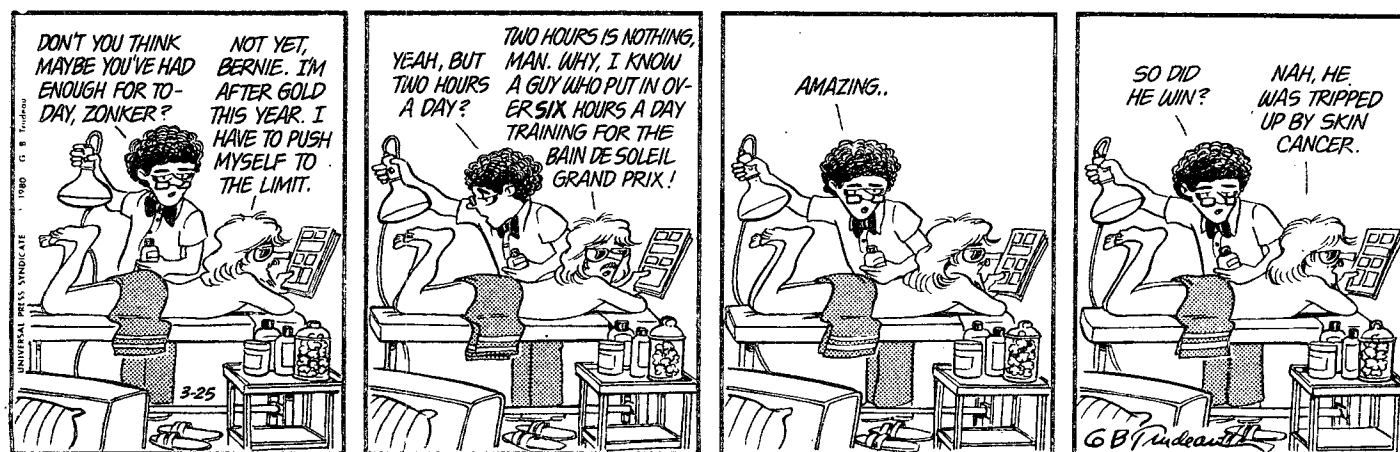

In light of the large tuition increase that was proposed, I believe a loud tuition protest was both appropriate and responsible. In large part because of the protest, student representatives were allowed to make a formal presentation to the Board of Trustees. Without these actions tuition would not have been cut by \$75. If students who are future alumni feel resentful towards Tufts because they are forced to pay for the past, present and future needs of Tufts in the tuition they pay, this will have a far more disastrous effect on the University than any article in the New York Times.

vote on raising the fee tomorrow night after hearing appeals so that "we'll have enough (money) if it's needed."

Twelve organizations filed with Senate treasurer Kip Harris yesterday to appeal their budget. Among those organizations scheduled to appeal their budget allotments are the frisbee club, Tae Kwon Do, Dimensions of Consciousness, the Tufts Daily, and the American Society of Civil Engineers.

Although no buffer fund is currently allotted under the FinCom budget, Thurm said the Senate expects a surplus of over \$8000 from this year's budget to provide the money for the fund.

Thurm said the student survey on the activities budget increase for next year will actually have its budget cut by over \$2000 in the plan. However, the Fincom proposal provides it with a buffer fund of \$4600 which will in effect raise its total budget by almost \$2000.

TUTV faces the biggest cut in the FinCom budget, with a decrease of over \$5000 from its 79-80 budget.

After appeals are heard on Tuesday night the FinCom budget must then be submitted to and approved by the full Senate.

## Swimmers Smash School Records

Tufts Men's Swim Team swam to a seventh place in the NCAA Division III National Championships held at Washington and Jefferson College, last Friday and Saturday.

Seven Tufts swimmers were named All-American by finishing their events in the top twelve. They were Gregory Bates, Peter Coassin, Michael Feldstein, Jim Lilley, Keith Miller, and John Montesi.

According to Steve Eisenhour, freestyle swimmer, Coach Don Megerle was pleased with the overall results and "very impressed with the diving."

a result of the university's expansion of the graduate experience. "Expansion requires attention," he commented, "and it's difficult to attend to the expansion and the focal point of the university. In the next five years," the Dean added, "the real issue is going to be

whether the core of the place remains solid."

Dean Harleston also expressed concern over the Trustees' involvement in the university's daily affairs. "This conveys some of a lack of confidence in our ability to run the university. I didn't like it," he said, "I felt uncomfortable with

it.

"What makes me happy," Harleston added, "is that we can deal with all of these problems."

In other matters, the Senate took a straw-poll vote giving the Financial Committee (FinCom) power to raise the student activity fee no more than \$4, if it became neces-

sary to do so to effectively complete the budget. The motion passed overwhelmingly. FinCom met late Sunday night to finalize next year's budget (see related article).

Also, Senator Chuck Greenberg was appointed as the Senate representative on the Tufts Cooperative Agencies.
