## Tufts Area Apartments Guilty of Lodging Violations

The Task Force on Lodging Houses set up by Medford City Manager Carol Sheehan has found six to seven houses in the area surrounding Tufts which are operating in violation of city or state laws, according to Chairman of the Task Force, Assistant City Manager John Ghiloni.

Ghiloni added, "a few houses have been found in violation of lodging students because they have four or five students in one apartment."

Massachusetts law allows only three unrelated people to live in one apartment. If there are more tenants, the house becomes a "lodging house" under the law, and must be licensed as such.

Victor and Cathy Gatto, who were charged last month by Medford Police of operating an illegal lodg-

ing house at 19-21 Fairmount Street, had a complaint sought against them dismissed Tuesday in Somerville District Court.

Ghiloni, however, said that the Gatto's originally were in violation of state law by having four people in one apartment in the house. He added that the Gatto's corrected the infraction by evicting one student, and that their case was consequently dismissed.

Gatto said yesterday, "It is true that we had four people in one apartment, but realtors and city inspectors told us before that we were o.k. if we had fewer than 5 people in one apartment."

Under Medford law, up to 5 people can live in one apartment without constituting a lodging house.

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## African American Ctr. Search Details Released

Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Sciences Frank Colcord released details of the "strategy for meeting the staffing needs of the African American (Culture) Center," yesterday.

The committee of nine will be chaired by Pearl Robinson, Assistant Professor of Political Science. The committee is composed of three faculty members, including Robinson, two members of the administration and four students.

The African American Center has been under the direction of Acting Director Gabe Gomez since the resignation of Roger Watkins last summer. Watkins appointment followed the resignation of Pat Hill-Collins last spring.

According to Colcord, the Personnel Department will begin an immediate search for an interim director who will serve

the remainder of this academic year. A five member sub-committee of the Search Committee will review those candidates.

The next step will be a national search for a permanent director, which should commence in November. Colcord hopes a permanent Director will be in place by June 1981.

"First we have to re-define what type of person we want for the center," said student member Wayne Owens, which, he added, "means redefining what the function of the center should be."

Both Gomez and Owens described some hesitancy in the plan to hire an interim director. "It takes a while to get used to the system" said Gomez, there's little point if you're then going to hire someone new."

Owens added that the committee will have difficulty finding an interim

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## Numerous Violations Plague Senate Elections

The TCU Senate has withheld release of the results of Tuesday's Senate, Sophomore Class and Educational Policy Committee elections in the wake of multiple student protests concerning campaign violations.

In a special meeting Tuesday night with the candidates charged with violations present, the Senate Election and Referenda Committee determined that a full Senate meeting would be necessary to handle the complaints. (These number nearly one-half of the 30 candidates).

Originally, the Tuesday night meeting was called as a hearing on the campaign violation charges. After senators and candidates pointed repeatedly to the ambiguous nature of the campaign guidelines and their contradiction with the TCU Senate by laws pertaining to elections, the Election and Referenda Committee determined that a special Senate meeting to discuss the situation was necessitated.

According to Phil Swain, Chairman of the Senate,

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## 'Loop' System Works as an Effective Warning

The Loop System effectively proved its worth on Tuesday night. Or rather, the Tufts Police proved the Loop System's worth by putting the system into action directly following an incident that the Dean of Students Office felt the students should know about.

Conversely, early Saturday morning news of an assault was not reported to the campus, because the Dean of Students Office designee was never contacted by the police to initiate the Loop system.

The officer on duty Tuesday night, Sargeant Holland, should be commended for his quick action. Thanks to him, students were promptly warned of the possibility of danger on campus and were advised to leave their dorm only in groups.

One final point should be mentioned. Just because an incident has not activated the loop it does not mean that students do not have to take precautions. The Loop System is not activated until a hazardous situation (i.e. assault) occurred. Don't take the chance of being the subject of a Loop System message.

### Student Bemoans Senate Elections

To the Editor:

The recent elections for the five empty TCU Senate seats have been a joke, to say the least. The results of the election were postponed because all but two or three candidates violated a rule which says that "posters are limited to two in each doorway." For years, candidates figured that one could put up as many posters inside the building as he or she wanted, but only two at each entrance. It's obvious that almost all of the people ever elected to the Senate have violated this rule, so a simple rephrasing of that portion of the Constitution would seem to be the proper solution, since the wording was ambiguous to begin with. If these candidates are to be punished or eliminated from the election, not only would that leave about two candidates (if any) in the election, but almost all of the senators currently in office were elected in violation of the Constitution, and therefore, all of them should be thrown out. Another election would serve no purpose and would benefit no one, but they seem to be in debate as to what they should do or what looks best in the paper. Of course, if these are the same people who think that a fifty-word

statement says anything at all about a candidate, that thirty candidates can fit sixty posters in each entrance, and that this system should continue as the popularity contest that it is, then at least they're being consistent. Now we can understand why the Senate might be dissolved- if we keep electing officers who work in this pattern, then nothing will ever get done. It's a shame that the entire student body has to be subjected to this.



the meeting will be conducted with two goals in mind: "To determine the policy for handling the present violations and to form a new process for more judicious and understandable elections."

Apparently, many candidates felt that the election guidelines were ambiguous. Senate candidate Mike D'Agostino raised the issue of the length of the candidate's statement. The campaign rules state that a candidate statement may be no longer than fifty words, though some candidates did submit statements in excess of that limit that were printed in their entirety in the October 7 issue of the Tufts Daily.

Candidates also pointed to ambiguities in the guidelines for placement and numbers of posters. The rules limit the maximum to two per entry way, but candidates claim that does not mean they cannot be placed elsewhere.

Swain commented yesterday that the rules are clear and "the violators will be dealt with if merit is established."

## IDC Discusses Dining Facilities, Assaults

The IDC discussed the existence of inadequate dining facilities on campus at their Tuesday meeting. Apparently, many students have complained of long lines, lack of seating, which have forced them to eat their meals rushed.

"I would like to see a survey of the ratio of meal plans to seats," said IDC chairman Jim McDermott. Tufts continues to build new dormitories and increase the number of students in campus housing, he added, without increasing dining facilities.

"Latin Way and the new Hillside dorm suites come equipped with kitchens," said Ann Fulginiti Administration Committee Chairman, "but most students still have meal plans and use them during peak hours."

In his report McDermott also said that the Tufts administration would be forced to rethink their policy on alcoholic beverages because of the fall and the increase in vandalism at campus functions where alcohol is served. The IDC called for increased responsibility by those serving drinks as well as by those drinking.

Committee reports were also given.

The Judiciary Committee is finalizing the constitution before it is presented to the body of the IDC for revisions.

The Administration Committee decided what problems they would investigate and try to tackle. The issues raised were the campus center, the new dorm, and the inadequate lighting and security on campus. The committee will be sending someone to the com-

### IDC TO INVESTIGATE DINING FACILITIES

The IDC decided this might be a good project with which to start the new year. The survey is just the beginning and can be used to show the real need for increased dining space. "The administration cannot change until they are shown that a need for change exists," said Steve Atlas.

In other matters, the IDC discussed the assaults on students that occurred this weekend, the girl who fell from West Hall, and the vandalism that surrounded various social functions.

The failure of the Loop system this weekend was described by McDermott as, "resulting from an error in judgement." In the future, no matter how insignificant an incident may seem, the Loop will be activated so that dorm residents may be warned.

mittee on the campus center to keep informed on the issue. They will also review the lighting on campus.

The Finance Committee spoke of this year's budget, Homecoming, and revising requirements for lending money. The IDC will have about \$200 a week to allocate for parties. They will also try to grant up to \$50 to any dorm who needs it but requests must be given to either Steve Atlas, Chairman of the Financial Committee, or Youseff Khat before the meeting next week.

Stricter requirements for lending and granting money were called for by the committee. "We may have to ask for buffer funds," said FinCom chairman Atlas. "We will have a greater chance of receiving them if we spend our money judiciously."

## Female Jogger Chased, Loop System Activated

A female student yesterday was followed by a male youth as she jogged down Curtis Street on Tuesday night. Immediately afterwards she notified the campus police who in turn activated the Loop System.

According to the police report, the jogger ran past the man, who was approximately 18-20 years of age. She spotted him a second time after she had slowed to a walk.

"I picked up my pace and he started to run after me," said the student in the report she submitted to the campus police.

When the jogger reached her dorm escorted by several friends, she promptly notified the police. Sergeant John Holland, the officer on duty Tuesday night, phoned Associate Dean of Students Bruce Reitman for the go-ahead to initiate the Loop System. The Loop System is the method currently used by the university to alert

the campus of the possibility of danger.

"I'm pleased that the sergeant on duty (Holland) recognized that this was a situation worth notifying the campus about," said Reitman. "If someone is assaulted and the (assailant) is apprehended, it's not necessary to use the Loop System. It's these unsolved incidents that must be publicized."

Reitman added that he was pleased with the success of the Loop System in the particular incident. "It can't always be flawless," he said, "but it's the best thing available."

The Loop System, after initiated, passes on the information through a series of chains or "loops" through which head residents phone other head residents concerning the particulars of the incident. They in turn notify the members of their dorm by posting the information at the respective dormitory entrance.

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## Baird Sparkles In Benefit

There was a little bit of Greenwich Village at Tufts Tuesday night as folk singer Lee(Bill) Baird performed in Lewis Hall lounge. Baird, a junior here who already has local club bookings, gave a benefit performance for the Environmental House. Although it didn't raise that much money, the show was certainly an artistic success.

"Intimacy" is the best word to describe the concert. About forty people sat around in a close circle, and watched as Baird played guitar and harmonica and sang. He told a lot of jokes and stories. He even talked personally to some of his friends in the audience. His manner was relaxed and friendly as he poked fun at himself as much as other topics, which ranged from girls to "Star Trek." The crowd, though small, was extremely receptive and even sang

along with Baird when he asked them to.

The selections were evenly divided between original material and cover versions of well-known folk songs, ranging from "Landslide" to "Will the Circle Be Unbroken." The covers were very good, but it was the originals that made the show sparkle.

Baird has a full, rich voice and an engaging personality, which he uses to great advantage in his songs. His solo "New Englander's Lament" was superb. When Baird matures to the point where he has the confidence to do all original material, his show will be a real treat.

Opportunities to see good musicians at such close quarters is rare, and it's a shame that so many students passed this one up. Lee Baird was a joy to watch, and his show reaffirmed the premise that he is one of Tufts' best natural resources.

nine people were living in one apartment at 19-21 Fairmount, a charge which the court rejected.

Ghiloni said that the Medford Task Force, comprised of the city's building, plumbing and fire inspectors as well as himself, investigated 15 to 20 residences which came off a list supplied by certain sources. He said it

was the police, not the task force, who initiated action against the Gattos.

One Medford landlord who has also been cited for a lodging house violation by investigators is Aime Prudhomme, a representative of the newly formed Hillside-Tufts Area Neighbors Association.

Prudhomme said yesterday that he has had four people

living in one of the two apartments at his 22 Fairmount Street house, but that he is correcting the violation by evicting one of the students.

He cited the divergence of Medford and Massachusetts law regarding lodging houses as the reason he had rented the apartment to four people.

Prudhomme also pointed to a recent housing advertisement which stated a rent of \$550 per month for a Somerville apartment, asking how only three students would be able to afford the apartment.

He said that Medford has decided to enforce the state statute requiring fewer than 4 residents in an apartment "so that people can sleep."

Places where there are no student residents, there aren't parties more than three to four nights a week," he added.

"Everybody has rights," Prudhomme said, "everybody has a right to get up and go to work in the morning without listening to twenty stereos the night before."

He said, "The neighborhood has deteriorated in the past four or five years. In some cases people are being driven from their homes."

Prudhomme said that because of the recent controversy surrounding Hillside housing, "there has been a line of communication opened between students and residents."
