

FROM THE EDITOR

Although there is a plethora of criticisms of the social climate on the hill, the lack of school spirit has received the most attention. The recent "Fall Festival" attempted to address the lack of unity on campus by bringing students and faculty together in an organized social event. While this was an enjoyable event, it did nothing to address the greater issues of a balkanized Tufts community. If the university is truly concerned with the lack of spirit on campus then it should look no further than its own administration. It is indeed ironic that politically correct campus governors are now making a concerted effort to enhance school spirit evn while failing to realize that their own social engineering policies are a hindrance to any attempts to create even a semblance of school unity.

Tufts' attempt to bring social utopia to Walnut Hill has resulted in the establishment of a segregated community. The sponsorship of culture houses and resource centers has created a separatist mentality at Tufts. Students of different racial backgrounds interact with each other even less as they now frequent such establishments as Start House, Capen House, the International House, the LGB Resource Center, and the Women's Center.

Caribbean Catastrophe

The Clinton Administration has finally reached an agreement in its latest round of bidding wars with Cuba over the refugee situation. The President has offered to allow increased legal immigration provided that Cuban dictator Fidel Castro take measures to curtail the exodus. The administration has refused to bring an end to the expanded economic sanctions it imposed last month. Meanwhile in Haiti, the military dictatorship clings to control the poorest people in the Western Hemisphere.

The official Clinton policy of the week with regard to Cuba is interdiction of refugees fleeing the political and economic catastrophe that has engulfed that island for years, and transport of them to the American military base at Guantanamo Bay.

Simultaneously, Clinton foreign policy experts are sailing the Caribbean in search of soldiers to help with the invasion of Haiti now called a "near certainty." Clinton is sacrificing the wrong people in both situations.

The 30-year old trade embargo on Cuba has left Castro's island in a time warp. His subjects are trying to enter the nineteen-sixties while the world is being catapulted into the twenty-first century.

Having been exposed to the benefits of capitalism by The Voice of America, Cubans set out for the beach to build (and sell) rafts that would cross the Florida Straits. The best course of action for America is to help Cuba lift the sanctions and let the people's will to re-join the rest of the world overthrow Fidel.

On the other hand, President Clinton is about to send American and Grenadan troops ashore in Haiti to replace a group of tyrants with a democratically-elected despot. Jean-Bertrand Aristide is not the savior of the Haitian people President Clinton makes him out to be. He frequently eliminated political appointees in much the same way the Cédras' regime has. Given Haiti's track record with heads-of state (like the Duvaliers), little can be done to help. As the election that supposedly validates Aristide's claim to power is in question, no legitimate military or political goal can be identified. Haiti has no strategic value to the United States and is irrelevant to America's national security.

The Commander-in-Chief's flip-flops on such vital issues as Cuba and Haiti indicate that he and his team are entirely inexperienced when it comes to developing a coherent foreign policy that places America's interests before the political fortunes of the President. Clinton's waffling on these matters is further indicative of his desire to come to the politically expedient outcome rather than a resolution that is best for both parties. President Clinton has proven himself to this point to be a foreign policy disaster who can only hurt America's standing in the new world order.

Abusing Families, Abusing Individual Rights

On May 23, 1994, a Georgia mother was arrested and imprisoned for child abuse when she reprimanded her son in a grocery store. Lynn Kivi slapped her son Chuck after he defied her directions to behave. A supermarket clerk who saw the exchange notified the local authorities, paving the way for a ludicrous situation.

Mrs. Kivi faced indictment on felony child abuse charges which carry a 20-year prison sentence. She was, in fact, impris-

> oned for two months while she spent thousands of dollars raising a defense. State and local child welfare agencies cried foul and demanded that the mother be further reprimanded for her inconsonant behavior. The groups were overly concerned with the "viciousness" of the "crime" and failed to see that such an action does, in fact, have a place in child-rearing. Moreover, they overlooked the right of the parent to determine the proper way to

raise a child. Brutality has no place in child rearing, but the "slap heard 'round the world" was neither brutal nor the business of anyone but Mrs. Kivi and her son.

The liberals that involve themselves in victimized groups are nothing more than advocates of big government and big brother. They invade people's privacy and mask their activism in the cloak of compassion. They are the same people who set up intricate bureaucracies to manage the various child welfare agencies that take away the rights of parents. Their actions are symbolic of the alarming policies of bleeding hearts who want nothing more than to replace the family with the state.

California Dreamin'

AIDS paranoia in the Golden State has caused officials in San Francisco and Los Angeles to take leave of their senses. In the former, the District Attorney has relaxed anti-prostitution policies; in the latter, the Mayor has authorized the subsidization of illicit drug use.

Harlotry has been rampant in the Bay City for years. Three to five prostitution cases are tried in San Francisco each day, and city police make more than 2,500 related arrests annually. In



recent years, the District Attorney has included used condoms found at prostitution sites in its prosecution of hookers and johns. Based on the logic that an arrest is worse than the contraction of a fatal illness, however, politically correct forces have argued that this policy discourages the practice of safe sex in the city's whorehouses and sleazy motels. The D.A. has agreed, and now promises to exclude prophylactics as evidence.

Likewise, three hundred miles to the south, residents of the City of Angels often behave in an impious fashion by using intravenous drugs and then sharing needles with their friends. The drug scene is a highly effective conduit for HIV. Consequently Mayor Richard Riordan has decided to distribute clean needles to the city's drug-users.

Both cities' governments naïvely believe that the hazards of a vice can be prevented by promoting it. It is prostitution and drug use themselves— not the scarcity of condoms or clean needles— that causes AIDS. The chances of a celibate person contracting HIV from a prostitute are non-existent, whereas condoms are at best 80 percent effective. 

Vet School Becomes Capitalist

On July 28, 1994, the Tufts University School of Veterinary Medicine finalized an agreement with the Commonwealth of Massachusetts that will allow Tufts to make the school a forprofit institution. The deal clears the way for the development of a biotechnology research park which will house the laboratories of several major companies on the Grafton campus. Since Massachusetts had originally given the 634-acre piece of land to Tufts "for the express purpose of creating a non-profit institution," the university needed the state to change the laws regarding the status of the school in order to deal with private for-profit corporations.

Governor Weld and Dean of the Veterinary School Franklin Loew support the deal because it will improve the quality of

The Irish will not be ruled by anti-Catholic ministers of state, nor will the Protestants be ruled by a theocracy in Dublin. Here, as in any case, democracy and self-rule are the only causes worth fighting for. Thankfully, the warring parties have finally come to that realization.

Orientation '94- A Freshman's Perspective

As a freshman who came to Tufts with four years of boarding school under his belt, I expected the various politically correct presentations that comprised Orientation.

Although I anticipated a more radical atmosphere than the one I had encountered at prep school, the events of orientation week were surprising.

Orientation began with Matriculation, a relatively innocuous event. It was a straightforward ceremony, that served as a fitting beginning to a college career at an institution as well-



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



Greening the Golden Calf

Karl Marx once wrote that religion is the "opium of the people." Faith in God and hopes for a perfect life in the after world, argued Marx, enable man to endure undue squalor and oppression on earth. As an atheist, Marx saw religion as nothing more than a tool of the ruling class. By keeping the proletariat's focus on the hereafter, the bourgeoisie could prevent the inevitable workers uprising that would result if the poor man would only live for the moment.

The echo of Marx's disbelief rings loudly throughout segments of the modern American political left. Among many American liberals, there exists an undeniable disdain for traditional religions. This contempt is clearly evidenced, for example, by the derisive manner in which liberal pundits discuss "the Christian Right" as maniacal and bigoted, or the connotations of disdain that inevitably accompany their use of the word "orthodox." There is little doubt that to be religious, in the traditional sense, has become "politically incorrect."

Many of these self-proclaimed "atheists," however, are very much still "religious." Although they have abandoned the traditional faiths, they are adherents to a new theology: radical environmentalism. They have a new god, planet earth, and a new code of morality, statist politics.

Unlike Marx, who rejected outright the existence of any god or gods, radical American environmentalists either restyle old gods to suit a political agenda, or create new ones. They are not atheists at all, in the true sense of the word. More appropriately, they might be called anti-religious, or even blasphemous. There can be no act more contemptuous of any deity than to deny His absoluteness. Nothing is more

offensive to religion itself than relegating it to a mere product of temporal political ambitions or social posturing.

Earth Day Meets Easter


In an opinion piece for The Wall Street Journal, Paulist Father Robert Sirico writes about the strangely religious tone of some environmentalists' celebration of Earth Day

1994. The National Religious Partnership for the Environment (NRPE), for example, suggested that various Protestant churches

conduct the following confessional:

We use more than our share of Earth's resources. 


the effects of pollution on the planet. Furthermore, it asserts a collectivist notion of guilt: we are all responsible for environmental calamity- just by being human.

The Christian environmentalists, aptly argues Father Sirico, have attributed to their

faith principles that are antithetical to those espoused in the Bible. Sirico notes: .

For Western religious traditions, the role of faith in public life has been to strive for justice and to improve life, not primarily for plants and animals, but for human beings There is no Commandment against littering, but there is a very straightforward one about worshipping false Gods The earth was a gift from God for our use...



Similarly, at the Rio de Janeiro Earth Summit of 1992, the United Church of Christ held a demonstration which included the hymn "Were You There When They Crucified My Lord"- but replaced the word "Lord" with "Earth."

The NRPE's confessional is politically loaded. It is founded on the Marxist zerosum notion that wealth and resources are earth and subdue it. Have dominion over the fish of the seas, the birds of the air, and all the living things that move on this earth." (1:28) He acknowledges that "no doubt there are right and wrong ways to till and keep, ways that are more pleasing to God and that show greater or lesser regard for the essential end for which the material world was made." It is such passages that earn traditional religions the disdain of the American political left. The religion is scorned because it contradicts political interests, or the liberal simply chooses to ignore the parts of the faith he finds inconve-

But the environmentalist not only disregards the less palatable aspects of the religion, he creates new elements that accord to his personal philosophy. Nowhere in the scriptures is recycling equated with the resurrection of Christ, or is using styrofoam listed among the Seven Deadly

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Sins, but such is the logical conclusion of the NRPE's confessional and the United Church's earthly hymn.

Attributing such notions to God, not on the basis of perceived revelation or divine

inspiration, but out of personal conviction, is little different than regularly rewriting the Bible to accommodate the political impetus *du jour*.

Establishing new deities to satisfy partisan interests is perhaps the most obvious ex-

ample of God being forced to submit to the will of man. Father Sirico reports that feminists who support the idea of a female deity and environmentalists who favor earth-worship, are increasingly paying homage to the Goddess Gaia. Gaia, who was first envisioned by scientist James Lovelock more than twenty years ago, is a cognizant and divine superorganism—she is also the planet earth. All that is on earth— the air, the oceans, plants, and animals— is part of this superorganism, as the hairs on our heads are

part of our very person. Thus, damaging the environment is no different than raping or murdering the deity herself.

It should be noted that such groups are by no means extreme or in the minority. Although nominally a Baptist, Vice President Al Gore incorporates part of the Gaia hypothesis into his Christianity. In Earth in the Balance, Gore writes: in the ethereal reaches of space, far removed from this planet? Are we still unconsciously following the direction of Plato's finger, looking for the sacred everywhere except in the real world?

One cannot blame environmentalists, many of whom have heartfelt convictions in

their political motivations, for seeking a religious justification of their policies. Nonetheless, the wholesale manipulation or fabrication of religious entities and scriptures to accommodate political ends indicates a lack of respect for the authority and overall durability of the divine.

Exploiting the deity or his words for political or personal interests is ultimately disrespectful to the deity and to the notion of religion itself. Surely God is more than a point of reference in rhetorical argument, that morality is nothing more than a human construct— designed and redesigned by nothing else than popular consensus?

When man rewrites God and religion to serve his ends, he is making God subservient to politics. The real value of God is deflated. Thus the spiritual revisionist or constructionist is guilty of the greatest of blasphemies.

The spiritual revisionist is far different from the atheist, such as Karl Marx, who simply denies the existence of any god or gods. The revisionist concedes the presence of some deity, but tramples that very entity nonetheless by prioritizing his own interests over its certainty. Of course there are some who would cynically argue that all religions are justifications for political or economic orders, but if one is to accept this conclusion and maintain a degree of intellectual honesty, he must be an atheist rather than swear allegiance to a false god just because doing so is politically convenient.

Of course environmentalists are not the first to reconstruct God to suit their purposes, and American liberals are by no means the only people who choose to overlook parts of the faith that they dislike.

It is difficult to condemn each of those people, most of whom are not guilty of sin as much as they are victims of their own naiveté and others' deception. 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It's a Mad, Mad, Mad, Mad World

War is being waged against democracy and freedom all over the world, yet few seem to realize it, and fewer still want to do

something about it. At this moment, people are engaged in armed combat in no less than 35 separate locations, according to the Defense Intelligence Agency. Analysts at DIA are predicting that a nuclear bomb will be detonated likely by a terrorist group— in a large population center within the next two decades.

Apparently apathetic toward threat of foreign turmoil, the United States' Congress has slashed defense budgets. Major high-tech and "smart weapon" projects have been terminated prior to their completion. The Secretary of Defense now admits that the capability of the American military to carry out two full-scale wars simultaneously

on opposite sides of the globe (its stated mission) is now in serious question.

After the Iron Curtain fell, liberals failed to acknowledge that America won the Cold War under Ronald Reagan's leadership, that the notions of allies and enemies had changed, and that that demanded prudent analysis of the developing situation. Instead, they claimed that Soviet collapse was inevitable and immediately moved to gut the defense budget so that spending on

social programs could go on unchecked by deficit hawks. As a consequence, the American military is a hollow shell of its former self, standing alone with the will to fight but without the money to do it.

A Proven Track Record

During the Reagan Administration, the National Security Agency developed a strategy to wear down the Soviet Empire with economic attacks, support of opposition movements, and the nuclear arms race. Compared to previous attempts to forestall Soviet advancement, these policies and their results prove that it is possible to defeat an enemy without firing a shot, but wholly impossible to do so without a military. The defeat of the East bloc in the 1980's proved

that the peaceniks who demanded a stop in military spending were simply dead wrong.

Having gained access to National Security directives and their authors, journalist Peter Schweizer describes the two canons of Reagan's strategy in his recent book, *Victory*. The president first emphasized the inherent evil of communism. The bloc defense— a structural offense— into the next century and elevated the arms race to a level that a communist system, given its inherent limitations, could never achieve.

According to a former officer in the nuclear navy, the concept driving Soviet Cold War offensive and military strategy was brute force. The Soviet military was armed with weap-

ons that were high on destruction and low on intelligence. In contrast, American smart technologies delivered destruction to the particular stone on the particular doorstep of that certain despot whom we disliked. America spent a lot of hard currency, and got exactly what it wanted. Ever fearful of American military superiority and a threat

to the motherland, the Soviets resolved to develop smart bombs of their own. The difference Reagan counted on is here. The Soviets spent billions in hard currency to research and begin development of new technologies. But the rest of the economy could not produce enough to feed the hungry bear. Defense spending rose markedly in America too, but increases in Soviet spending consumed an addi-

Reagan described as the "Evil Empire," truly was a brutal and deadly regime that practiced worker enslavement and demanded total subservience to the state. This proclamation re-affirmed the staunch opposition of the United States to communism's very existence and demonstrated that the Cold War would not end in stalemate. It was a drastic change from the policies of previous administrations, and as such sent shock waves rippling through the Soviet war machine.

The systemic build-up and modernization of American and NATO armies brought tional 8% of the USSR's national product every year.

The Lull After the Storm

The demise of the evil empire meant that the United States was without a polar opposite as a military opponent. Spending on military hardware, research and personnel reached its peak in the mid 1980's, and has been on a steady decline since. The US now spends much less money on defense as

of American politics lop off defense projects and plans without a second thought while they continually advocate such wasteful spending programs as midnight basketball. Bleeding hearts in Congress recently ended the spectacular Patriot Missile program, made the umpteenth

reduction in the number of Stealth Bombers on order, and at President Clinton's directive, tabled the Strategic Defense Initiative ("Star Wars"). The trend does not stop with expensive high-tech systems. The Navy recently decommissioned an aircraft carrier and set its Battle Group to pasture without plans for replacement in the near future.

Our Navy has come to resemble a flotilla of ships in Mr. Clinton's bathtub ready to be dispatched to the coast of this week's hot spot or sent around continents to take part in political sideshows. The military is no longer able to fight two ground wars at once, still cannot put Castro in his place, and was even unable to find a Somali warlord. Soldiers are now set at giving out food to refugees in central Africa when their duty lies in protecting the national interests of the United States. Fresh off victory in the Cold War, American defense is now in disarray and disrepair.

Threats Old and New

As the US rests on its laurels, hidden pitfalls are coming up. Bosnia-Herzegovina was an unheard-of part of the world when it was behind the Iron Curtain. North Korea is only the most recent dictatorship to be caught in the middle of manufacturing weapons of mass destruction.

Terrorist states, quiet for years, always have the ability to change their tune very quickly. Dictators put in their place by Reagan's strong-arm tactics and the Gulf War are still very real enemies with operatives ready to kill innocent civilians at any time. Having been armed by both sides during the Cold War, third world countries discovery of errant plutonium in Germany two weeks ago and in Hungary last week is

cause for much concern. Most terrorists and terrorist states have either the money or the friends to acquire the necessary materials to construct a crude but effective nuclear bomb. Any one of the warheads for sale by profiteering ex-Soviets can easily make a madman into a nuclear power.


> Alarmist ideas about population explosion stem from the doctrines of Reverend Thomas Malthus. His *An Essay on the Principle of Population*, printed in 1798, states that population increases at a geometric rate, while food production increases at an arithmetic rate.

Thus, some portion of the population will always be condemned to starvation. It is interesting to note that Malthus' ideas were highly favorable to foes of capitalism; they maintained that under capitalism the population outdistanced food supply, leaving the working class in a permanent state of poverty. Even today egalitarians argue that the only way to adequately feed humanity is to erect a post-capitalist, non-hierarchical societal structure. Malthusians focus on an exponential trend solely of population growth, and ignoring the faster growth trends of economics and food production.

Lester Brown is one of the foremost proponents of environmental disaster and population control. Brown is the president of the Worldwatch Institute, and publishes the alarmist State of the World annually. He has notoriously claimed that world food production had peaked, leading to inevitable famines. In 1967, as administrator of the Agricultural Development Services, he claimed, "The trend in grain stocks indicates clearly that 1961 marked a worldwide turning point... food consumption moved ahead of production." In 1974, his book Not by Bread Alone predicted that the end was in sight after world food stocks were drawn down following bad harvests in 1972 and 1974. In 1989, Brown cited reductions in the world's grain stocks and predicted global food shortages. He is consistently wrong- world food supplies continue to grow as prices decline.

An initial read of the morbid predictions of the advocates of population control will indeed frighten the reader. In a piece covering the conference, *The New York Times* states that over 90 million people are being added to the population each year, "the highest nu-

merical growth in human history." The piece also predicts that "in only 11 years," from 1987 to 1998, the world's population will grow from five to six billion, "adding more bodies to feed, house, clothe and educate than the present combined populations of

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entists of population control. His sensationalist piece in 1968, The Population Bomb, predicted a series of famines in the 1970s that would cause hundreds of millions of people to starve to death. In 1990, his The Population Explosion, claimed that starvation and epidemic disease will raise death

rates over the entire planet. In the first Earth Day issue of The Progressive, 1970, in Ehrlich predicted that 65

million Americans will die of famine and four billion people world wide from 1980 to 1989. Ehrlich's doomsday predictions for the 1970s and 1980s never realized their fruition. While any amount of death from starvation is tragic, the levels were nothing

like the apocalyptic numbers that Ehrlich predicted.

A blatant example of Ehrlich's radical agenda is included in the form of the following recommendation as part of his program to prevent population explosion: "We must institute the Chinese Communist system of compulsory abortion and various forms of infanticide so that each couple will have only one child. We must hope that our government doesn't wait until it, too, decides that coercive measures can solve America's population problem... the price of personal freedom in making childbearing decisions may be the destruction of the world."

The Real Facts

The Malthusian claims of Brown and Ehrlich do not mount

up against the overall positive economic trends. Malthusians, such as Ehrlich and Brown subscribe to the "carrying capacity" theory. That theory holds that any given ecosystem can only support a limited number of a single species. Ehrlich quite readily applies this reasoning to human beings, "If too many people are devouring it, the food

supply declines; too little food, the supply of animals declines... Homo sapiens is no exception to the rule, and at the moment it seems likely that food will be our limiting resource." The fallacy of Ehrlich's analogy is demonstrated by the following comment from Harvard Population Center demographer Nick Eberstadt: "One of the reasons that Ehrlich's been so wrong is that he has no understanding of or sympathy for the

For example, the carrying capacity of the American continent north of the Rio Grande before 1600 without modernization was between six and twelve million people. It now supports 300 million people. the University of Chicago rejects the carrying capacity model as it applies to human beings. He says, "Except where civil wars exist or despotic governments prevail, there has never been a time during the last two centuries when the people in the developing world were better fed or when their food supply was more secure."

There are other facts to dispute the false claims of the overpopulation freaks. In East Asia, births per woman declined from 6.1 in 1960-65 to 2.7 from 1980-85. In Latin America, there were 5.9 births per woman in 1960-65, and 3.6 births per woman in 1980-85. For all of the developing countries, the births per woman rate was 6.1 in 1960-65 and 3.9 in 1985-90. According to the UN, the total fertility rate has gone from 59 percent to a level of no-growth in the developed world, and 62 percent of the way toward that level in the Third World.

Death rates have plummeted, dispelling any increasing starvation myths. Worldwide life expectancy at birth rose from 47.5 years in 1950 to 63.9 years in 1990 and the

1968 made the point that developed countries "are overpopulated by the simple criterion that they are not able to produce enough food to feed their populations."

Ehrlich's claims are wrong. Since World War II, the world's population has doubled, while food production has tripled. D. Gale Johnson, an agricultural expert from


infant mortality rate dropped from 155 to 70 per 1,000 births. Even in countries with per capita incomes under \$400, the average life expectancy rose spectacularly from 35 years in 1960 to 60 in 1985. Any population explosion is attributed to falling death rates rather than rising birth rates.

Feeding the "Masses"

Technology is the primary reason that the Malthusians are wrong. The Green Revolution

of the 1960s, was a scientific procedure in which hybrid plants were created. It developed high-yielding fertilizer-responsive dwarf varieties of cereal grains. As a result, more food products can be produced

In recent years isolationist countries have slowly opened their doors to world trade and free markets. ple will suffer from poverty, unemployment, and increased income disparity. In addition, there are underlying social reasons that prevent a quicker spread of capitalism. Latin America's lower classes may be reluctant to make the cultural adjustments necessary to thrive in a capitalistic environment.

Many lower class families of Latin America associate being wealthy with being materialistic and pretentious. This correlation on such a widespread basis creates a region that lacks innovation and ingenuity to create wealth. Instead, most aspire to lead pious lives, earning a living to support basic

> needs rather than upgrading their standard of living. The Latin American dream does not include a white picket fence or a better life for their children. Furthermore, when individuals encounter financially troubled times, they have neither the skills nor the

mentality to recover from their impoverished position.

Adjustment to a capitalistic system is a highly complex process requiring both governmental and individual changes. On a governmental level, education must be improved to create a work force able to compete with international competition. In addition, the political system itself must be flexible to permit and encourage free enterprise while accepting refinements to avoid corruption and civil unrest. On an individual level, the mentality of the work force must be such that it provides a resource to industry. Furthermore, individual mentality must not serve as a hindrance to taking advantage of the economic opportunity in a free market. The average Latin American must realize that economic growth will directly benefit him, his family, his community, and his entire nation.

Most importantly, however, the social problems of Latin America, such as poverty and unemployment, must be solved by attacking the source. Easing these problems with bulky bureaucratic programs provides no long-term solutions and misuses precious resources which may otherwise be used toward a productive and successful future. Just as the people of Latin America must recognize the opportunities which lay ahead of them, we in the United States must also recognize the advantages inherent in a strong Latin America. As a strong trading partner, where US companies could conduct business, and one which is ripe with natural resources, the United States should not overlook Latin America.

on smaller land space. India has doubled its wheat yields within a few years; China supports 22 percent of the world's population on only 7 percent of its arable land. China's farmers increased food production by more than 50 percent in only six years once the communist government let them

grow crops on privatelyowned plots.

Over the past forty years, corn, wheat, and soybean yields per acre in the US have increased 220 per-

cent, 107 percent, and 60 percent respectively. Since the 1970s world wheat yields are up 36 percent, rice is up 38 percent, and coarse grains are up 30 percent.

Veery wheats, suitable for subtropical Africa will increase yields up to fifteen percent. Chinese hybrid rice increases yields upwards of 30 percent.

High-yield agriculture has also produced many other success stories. A hybrid rice has been developed in China that has the potential to increase yields by 25 percent for almost all of the world's rice plantings. Shorter season corn varieties have expanded the world's corn belt by 500 miles, benefiting Canada, Russia, and China.

There have also been developments in animal husbandry. Bovine somatotropin is produced naturally in the body of cattle, and functions to control milk production. Harmless bacteria have been genetically altered to produce the hormone so that it can supplement the amount in the cow's body. Thus, the amount of milk yielded can be increased by 25

percent on the same amount of feed. Bovine somatotropin is safe for both cows and people. Before 1950, the average cow produced 5,314 pounds of milk annually, while the same cow today produces 14,300 pounds due to bovine somatotropin.

There are also ways to increase soil fertility. Fertility rates can be increased by

90 percent in the Amazon rain forest by planting the kudzu weed. Furthermore, new irrigation techniques are being employed to eliminate the phenomenon of water logging which causes salt salinization. Dixie Lee Ray, the former governor of Washington, writes in her book *Environmental Overkill* that, "New irrigation techniques are replacing the old style general flooding. Sprinkler, drip, and trailing tube irrigation systems

The True Culprits: Shattering the Socialist Lies

Stalin starved the Ukraine region in the 1930s. Ethiopia's General Mengistu halted food aid to rebel regions of his country in the 1980s, and somalian warlords created famine in the 1990s. These tragedies in no way indicate that humanity is exceeding its carrying capacity. These despotic tactics are coming to an end as the United Nations develops a food relief program.

Many extremists cite Africa as a continent that is breaching its carrying capacity. Africa actually has over 760 million hectares (1 hectare is the equivalent of 2.47 acres) of cultivable land, over three and one half times that currently cultivated in the United States. Only 160 million hectares are presently being farmed. Why doesn't Africa produce more food?

Ronald Bailey, a science writer, provides the answer in his book, ECOSCAM: The False Prophets of Ecological Apocalypse. "When an African farmer realizes that he will receive only a fraction of the real value of his crops, he has little incentive to grow more than his family needs. This leaves African farmers in the precarious position


> that subsistence farmers have endured since time immemorial. With no surplus to fall back on and no money earned from the sale of earlier crops, if something goes wrong, then the farmer's family will go hungry."

It is ironic that the advocates of population control support the expansion of government into private affairs. Totalitarian regimes prevent the implementation of a free economy; it is the free economy which fosters the scientific and technological advancement that feeds increasing numbers of

people. The doomsayers of population control are too involved in promoting their socialist agenda instead of listening to free market common sense.

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
