A D M I S S I O N
TO THE
R E G U L A R C O L L E G E C O U R S E .

APPLICANTS for admission must produce certificates of good moral character. If they come from other Colleges, certificates also of their regular dismissal therefrom are required.

For admission to the Freshman Class, an examination must be well sustained in the following Studies:—

Latin.—Andrews' Latin Reader ; Virgil's Bucolics, and six books of the *Æneid* ; Cæsar's Commentaries ; Cicero's Select Orations, Folsom's Edition ; Andrews and Stoddard's Latin Grammar, including Prosody ; Arnold's Latin Prose Composition.

Greek.—Felton's or Jacobs' Greek Reader, or four books of Homer's *Iliad*, with three books of Xenophon's *Anabasis* ; Sophocles', Crosby's, or Kühner's Greek Grammar, including Prosody ; Arnold's Greek Prose Composition ; writing Greek with the Accents.

Mathematics.—Chase's Arithmetic; Sherwin's Algebra, to Involution; Hill's First Lessons in Geometry.

History.—Modern Geography; Mitchell's Ancient Atlas; Goodrich's History of the United States.

N. B.—For the Text Books here mentioned, such other Text Books as are equivalents, will be accepted. The same remark may be made in reference to the Course of College Studies.

For admission to an advanced Class, an examination must be well sustained, both in these Studies, and in the Studies through which such Class has passed.

No person will be admitted after the beginning of the Senior year.

Examinations for admission will be held on the day after Commencement, and on the Tuesday preceding the beginning of the Fall Term. The examination will begin at 8 o'clock, A. M., on each of these days.

N. B.—No Applicant will be examined, except upon the condition that he will join his class immediately, if admitted.

On admission, every candidate must secure, by a bond of \$200, with two signers, the payment of all his College Bills. To be admitted to advanced standing, he must also pay one half of the tuition which has accrued in the previous terms of the Regular Course, unless he comes from another College; provided, that, if he be admitted at the beginning of the Senior Year, the tuition of the Junior Year shall be the only arrears required of him.

No Student who has been dismissed shall be admitted again, unless he pays the whole tuition of the interval;

and, in the regular course of Study, tuition will be charged for no period less than a year.

PARTIAL COURSE OF STUDY.

Persons who do not enter for a College Degree, and who produce certificates of good moral character, may be received to such studies, in any Class, as they shall be found qualified to pursue with profit; and they may continue therein at their pleasure, on condition of obeying the laws of the College, and paying one-third more than the regular tuition for the number of Terms they remain.

DEGREE OF MASTER OF ARTS.

The Degree of Master of Arts is conferred on every Bachelor of Arts of three years' standing, or more,—who in the interval, has sustained a good moral character,—on application to the President, one week, at least, before Commencement.

The fee, including the Diploma, is five dollars, payable in advance.

PUBLIC COLLEGE EXERCISES.

A Public Examination of all the Classes will be held, during not less than four days, twice a year. There will also be, in the Second Term of each year, a Public Exhibition; for which parts will be assigned to members of the Junior Class, according to their general Scale of Merit.

RELIGIOUS OBSERVANCES.

All resident Under-Graduates, resident Students in Partial Course, and resident Officers of Instruction, are required to attend Morning Prayers, and the Reading of the Scriptures, in the Chapel.

All Students are required to attend Public Worship on Sundays, in the Chapel, except those of legal age, who on their application to the President, in writing—and minors, who on the application of their parents or guardians, have been permitted to attend the public services of any other denomination of Christians having a place of worship in Medford or Somerville,—such worship being that in which they have been educated, or which from conscientious motives they are desirous of attending.

PRIZES.

In the Second Term of the Academical year, prizes will be assigned from the Goddard Prize Fund. They will be distributed the present year as follows:—

A Prize of "Motley's Dutch Republic," (3 vols.) and Motley's New Netherlands," (2 vols.) for the best Dissertation, by a member of the Senior Class, on the following subject: "The comparative value of contemporary and subsequent narrations of historical events."

A Prize of "Müller and Donaldson's History of the Literature of Ancient Greece," (3 vols.) for the best Greek Prose Composition, by a member of the Junior Class, on the following subject: "De Origine et Usu Oraculorum."

A Prize of "Smiles' Engineers," (2 vols.) for the best Examination in Algebra, Geometry, and Trigonometry, by a member of the Sophomore Class.

A Prize of "Smith's Dictionary of Greek and Roman Biography and Mythology," (3 vols.) for the best Latin Prose Translation,

by a member of the Freshman Class, of the extract from Gibbon's "History of Rome," Boston Ed., 1854, vol. iii., chap. xxxiv., beginning p. 411,—“When Attila,” &c., and ending p. 413,—“the King of the Huns.”

The Dissertations, and the Greek and Latin Prose Compositions must be left at the President's Office, by the 1st day of June, in sealed envelopes, accompanied by sealed letters containing the authors' names.

No Dissertation to exceed in length the amount of fifteen pages of the "North American Review," and no Greek Prose Composition to exceed in length three pages of Felton's Greek Historians.

TERMS, VACATIONS, AND COMMENCEMENT.

The Academical Year is divided into two Terms. The First Term begins six weeks after the second Wednesday of July, and ends on the second Wednesday of January. The Second Term begins six weeks after the second Wednesday of January, and ends on the second Wednesday of July.

At the end of each Term, there is a Vacation of six weeks. There are Vacations also from the Tuesday evening next before the Annual Thanksgiving till the following Monday evening; on Christmas Day; on the day of the Annual Fast; from Tuesday evening of Anniversary Week, to the next Monday noon; and on the Fourth of July.

The Public Commencement is held on the second Wednesday of July.
