CSL Affirms Knable's Decisions

On Monday the Committee on Student Life (CSL) sustained two disciplinary actions taken by Dean of Students Bobbie Knable. The committee's action affirms her decision to revoke university housing either permanently or currently. In other matters, the CSL endorsed a resolution concerning the future of the Campus Center Proposal.

In the first of the disciplinary cases, two students appealed Dean Knable's decision to expel them from their current housing. The case involved "extended

disturbance"; namely, persistent noise and rowdiness. The CSL sustained the Dean's punishment.

The second disciplinary appeal came from a student who turned himself in for using fireworks in his dormitory. In a well-presented speech, the Tufts freshman admitted his guilt, through ignorance. Although he presented it as guilt, he requested the CSL to give him an alternative punishment. "Not less punishment, just a different kind," he stated. He offered to work 10 hours a week for the

IDC May Fund Observer

On Tuesday, the IDC Judiciary Committee made a motion to separate fundings through the faculty of the Arts and Sciences for *The Observer*. At present, *The Observer* receives its funding from the Senate, as do all of the large student organizations on campus.

The IDC feels it would be wise to separate the largest form of informational media at Tufts from those who support it. The motion was unanimously agreed upon and a committee will be formed to investigate the matter.

The Inter-Dormitory Council (IDC) discussed issues concerning legislation on grants and loans to dorms for parties at their meeting Tuesday night. Also, the IDC Judiciary Committee una-

nanimously passed a motion to investigate a transfer of funding for *The Observer* from the Senate to the IDC.

Paul Schawber, chairman of the IDC Financial Committee, proposed that all budget approvals given to dorms by the IDC should be final. Changes in a party's theme or in the distribution of expenses will not be allowed unless they are approved by the FinCom committee Chairman or Treasurer.

The IDC claimed that if a dorm decides to change any arrangements for a party, it may not need as much money from the IDC. They stated that their responsibility is solely to help dorm parties get started by giving out either grants or loans to the dorms. The IDC is not concerned with profits made by the dorms.

Campus Center Moves Toward Reality

When we will have a campus center is the issue now being debated by the administration and various committees. The need for such a center has been favorably accepted and supported by the administration. However, details in the proposal have been questioned, causing a delay in the procedures.

The idea for a campus center was initiated by Dean of Arts and Sciences Bernard Harleston, who is now the chairman of the Campus Center Committee. Work on the project began last October, with the assistance of Ted Tye, the proposal's coordinator. The completed proposal was then submitted, in February, to the review of the trustees, who were meeting to discuss a

considered at the next Trustee Board meeting, May 7th.

However, the proposal must be considered by the Trustee Executive Committee before May 7. Last Tuesday, Vice President Shira met with the President's Council, who have sent their questions to Dean Harleston. The next step will be for Dean Harleston to meet with the Campus Center Committee. After changes and rewriting in the proposal have been debated and accepted, it will then be subject to the review of President Mayer, who will either accept or reject the proposal. The major dispute is the financial commitment. Presently the estimated cost for the Center is \$4.47 million. The administration would like

tuition hike. During this meeting, to the surprise of many, President Mayer requested that the proposal for a center be resubmitted to the Administration for further review.

Now at the end of March, the Campus Center Committee, as well as the entire student body, is urging the Administration to act immediately to resolve their questions in order that the proposal be

to see some cuts in this figure. "We're not delaying," said Mayer, "we just don't want the trustees to vote against (the campus center). The trustees want a clear and sensible financial picture and then we can go ahead."

After Mayer accepts the proposal, it will then be sent to the Trustee Executive Committee.

Activities Fee Hike Justified

Tuesday night the Senate Finance Committee heard presentations from twenty-seven student organizations appealing their budget allocations for 1980-81. The committee gave additional money to twenty-three of those organizations for a total of \$10,583 in newly allocated funds, forcing them to raise the student activities fee to \$47, from its present \$43. The \$4. fee increase is justified.

At a meeting last Thursday the committee struggled through the night to divide the income that the present fee provides, and apparently displeasing many organizations in the process. At Tuesday night's late session it became clear that the committee could no longer work with the present fee.

The FinCom should be praised for wisely acknowledging the need to increase the activities fee. Another \$4. will go a long way to help organizations provide more service to Tufts students.

University, mentioning his willingness to speak on safety to freshmen.

The CSL, in an executive session, decided not to accept the student's request, thus sustaining the Dean's punishment, revoking his housing privileges permanently.

The third important issue concerned the delays in the Campus Center Proposal. Kenny Lefkowitz, Phoebe Hogg and Dan Winslow (CSL members) presented a resolution which in effect stated that the proposed Campus Center may be the

single most effective means of improving life at Tufts, and that continued delay of Trustee action on the Campus Center Proposal may tend to defeat the possibility of constructing a campus center. The resolution called for the administration to present a favorable statement to the trustees on construction of the Center, and requested the President, or his representative, "to address the committee on issues of concern to the administration on the Campus Center Proposal."

New Movie Leaves You Laughing

Walnut-shaped, hazel eyes enfolded in caramel creme peer imploringly into watery-blue puddles swimming in freckled wrinkles. A grumpy "You can stay if you keep your nose clean" draws an explosion of tears and parental passion from both "sorrow" and "the kid." Walter Matthau ("Sorrow") and Sara Simpson ("the Kid") enchanted everyone from six to ninety-six in "Little Miss Marker" now playing at the Sack Beacon Hill.

Andrews completed the threesome with her love and adoration-of both Matthau and Simpson. Andrews' chic exterior juxtaposed with Matthau's "Oscar Madison" facade created an air of comfortable compatibility. However, nothing could infringe upon the monopoly that "sorrow" and "the kid" held on the love market. "Little Miss Marker" will leave you laughing, will leave you crying, will leave you loving. 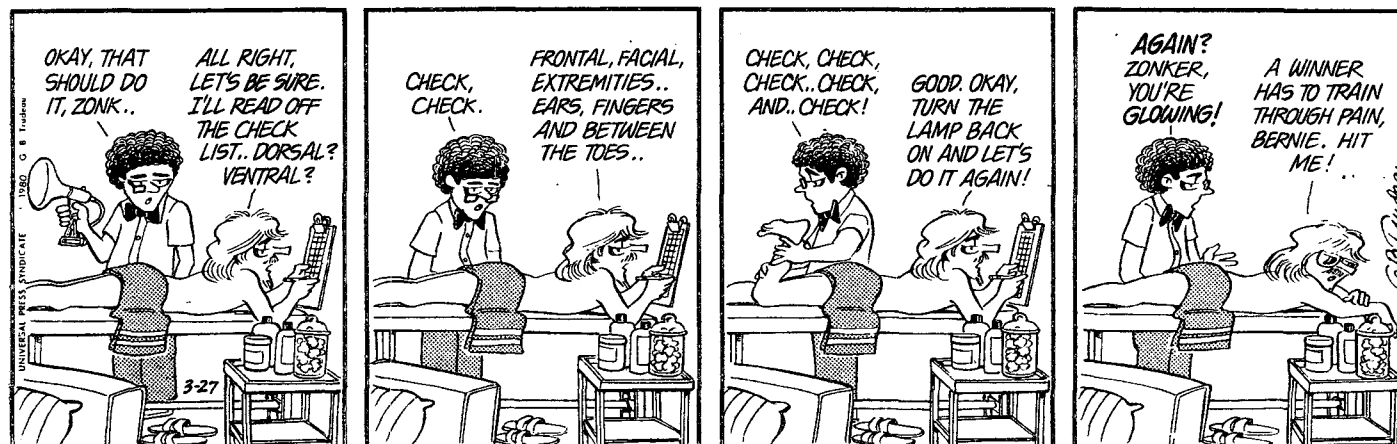

Committee consists of four members, who are the chairpeople for the committee's sub-committees: management, finance, grounds and buildings, resources. This committee has the option of either sending the proposal on the the Full Trustee Board or channeling it through the sub-committees for further consideration. According to members of the Campus

Center Committee, the hope is that the proposal will be passed on to the full board. If it is not passed, the proposal will be delayed until the next Trustee Board meeting in October.

The Campus Center Committee feels that this would cause a needless delay. The alternative would be for the full board to review the proposal and then channel it through the different sub-committees. This alternative is strongly supported by the Campus Center Committee. However, according to Ted Tye, "We have to live with the decisions the Vice Presidents make." So far those decisions are progressing on a positive path. Tom Alperin, the TCU Senate and a member of the Campus Center Committee, sincerely believes that "we will get a positive report from the Trustee Executive Committee."
