

These cases reveal the historical contingency of the basic category, religion, and its circulation through intercultural contacts, colonizing appropriations, and globalizing exchanges.







### "The Politics of Human Rights" Judith Butler


Maxine Elliot Professor of Rhetoric and Comparative Literature, UC Berkeley

This lecture considers the importance of human rights in critical legal studies, political thought, and postcolonial theory, with consideration of situated struggles in various global locations. It investigates the genealogy of human rights, from European theories of natural man and naturalrights, to contemporary practices of international law, humanitarianism and social movements for justice, with consideration of the speaker's recent work on precarity, grievability, speech and assembly.

## **Humanities Reading Group**




Faculty from across the arts and humanities departments meet several times a semester to discuss readings on the role of the humanities in public life. Contact <u>John Lurz</u> if interested.
