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## E CLIPSES. 1790.

**T**HREE will be six Eclipses this Year, four of the Sun, and two of the Moon.

The first will be a very small Eclipse of the Sun, on Wednesday the 14th Day of April, at 11 minutes after 8 o'clock in the Morning, invisible to us.

The second will be a total Eclipse of the Moon, on Wednesday the 28th day of April; in part visible, and by calculation as follows:

The fifth will be of the Moon, on Friday the 22d Day of October, visible and total, and by calculation as follows:
