Of the benefit of mixing Soils in order to fertilize the Land, lay P or graf In an extract of a Letter to a Friend,

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Have heretofore made experiments of this kind, and here Have heretotore made experiments of the large never knew them to fail in a fingle Instance. I took thehere hint from Bradley's treatise on Husbandry and Gardening, inquanti which he gives an inflance of two large fields (the one pure exami fand, and the other tough clay, that the owner fet no man-iner of value on) being render'd more fruitful than any other fields in the fame county, by no other means but mixing, which was, as near as I can recollect, done in the following manner. The owner constantly employ'd his teams, when they were not otherwise necessarily engaged, in carring clay to the fand field, and returning fand to the clay field, until he had covered each of them with earth from the other, about fix inches deep, after that, the day field was ploughed verdeep, and turned over the fand which had been laid upon it, and lay exposed to the frost one whole winter, as was al-To the clay which had been laid upon the fand field; the Ifrequent operation of the frost upon the clay flacked it as much as lime is flacked, by which means it was rendered capable of being mixed with the fand by repeated plough ings, and thereby made be for use. The land (before totally useless) for ten years successively, produced a crop of Wheat of full thirty bushels, without any manure. In this new country manure is very scarce, especially on new farms where but little flock can be kept. We abound in fandy lands especially in Plymouth county, and in some parts of the county of York; and in Plymonth county, there is scarcely a hundred acres together any where without fome clay on, or near it, and fines the experiment is so easy, and certainly produces such good effects, it is well worth making.

Where farmers are weak banded as to teams, and cannot find means to come up to Mr. Bradley's rise, a smaller quantity should be applied: If, for instance, a farmer should chance to have a clay-pit near his fandy field, he should eart clay fusficient to cover the fand only two inches, even tho' he should carry it into wheel-barrow, he would find more account in it than from fo much dung. I speak this from experience. It would always be belt to cart the clay in the fall, and lay it in small heaps properly distributed over the land; it would by this means, by frequent wets, hears and frosts, be often per into a flate of fermentation, and render ed fit to be spread over the land .- This fort of dressing has greatly the advantage of dung, in that its effects are more durable, and it produces no infects to devour your crop,

A cure for Frost-bitten Feet.

Take the fat of a dung-hill fowl, and rub the place, or places affected with it, morning and evening, over a warm fire; at the same time wrapping a piece of woollen cloth well greafed with the faid fat, round the frost-bitten parts: in two or three days they will feel no pain, and in five or fix days will be quite cured.

Note, If the inner bark of elder, or the leaves of plantain

are first simmered in said fat, it will be the better.
