Superior Courts in the State of CONNECTICUT.

AT *Fairfield*, the last Tuesday save two in August. At *Danbury*, the last Tuesday save two in February. At *New-Haven*, the last Tuesday save one in February and August. At *Hartford*, the first Tuesday in March and September. At *Windham*, the third Tuesday in March and September. At *New-London*, the fourth Tuesday in September. At *Norwich*, the fourth Tuesday in March. At *Litchfield*, the first Tuesday in February and August. At *Middletown*, the last Tuesday of July. At *Haddam*, the last Tuesday of January. At *Tolland*, the Tuesday preceding the last Tuesday in January.

Supreme Court of Errors at *Hartford*, on the Tuesday of the week next preceding the second Thursday in May. At *New-Haven*, on the Tuesday next preceding the second Thursday in October.

County Courts.

At *Hartford*, the first Tuesday in April and November. At *New-Haven*, the first Tuesday in April and second in November. At *New London*, the second Tuesday in June. County of GRAFTON.

Superior Court at *Plymouth*, the fourth Tuesday of May, and at *Haverhill*, the third Tuesday of October. Inferior Court at *Plymouth*, the first Tuesdays of September and December; at *Haverhill*, the first Tuesdays of March and June.

The Yearly Meetings of the Friends, commonly call'd Quakers.
[Corrected from the erroneous Publications in Almanacks for many Years past.]

THE Yearly Meeting on Rhode-Island, beginning at Portsmouth, is on the 5th day before the 2d 6th day of the 6th month; Composed of three Quarterly Meetings, which go by the Name of Rhode-Island, Salem, and Sandwich.—Rhode-Island Quarter is held on the 5th day before the 2d 6th day of the first month, at Swarzey. In the 4th month at East-Greenwich. In the 7th month, at Smithfield upper Meeting-House. And in the 10th month at Dartmouth.—Salem Quarter is held at Seabrook, (formerly Hampton) on the 7th day before the 4th 1st day of the 1st month. At Salem, the 1st 6th day of the 6th month. At Falmouth, on the 7th day before the 4th 1st day in the 9th month. And at Dover, the 7th day before the 4th 1st day in the 10th month. Sandwich Quarter is held at Falmouth, on the 2d 6th day in the 12th month. At Sandwich, the 6th day before the last 1st day in the 3d month. At Nantucket, the 3d day after the 4th 6th day in the 6th month. And at Long Plain, the 7th day before the 2d 6th day in the 10th month.

ECLIPSES for the Year 1789.

THERE will be four Eclipses this year ; two of the SUN, and two of the MOON, in the following order, viz.

- I. The First of the Moon on *Saturday* the ninth Day of May in the Morning, partly visible, and calculated as follows, viz.

Digits eclipsed $2\frac{2}{3}$ on the northerly side.

Note. The Moon sets 51 min. after 4 o'Clock, so that the going off, or end of the Eclipse, will be invisible to us.

- II. The Second of the Sun, Lord's Day May 24th, at about half past 4 o'Clock afternoon, invisible by reason of the Moon's south Latitude. It happens in the fourth degree of *Taurus*.

- III. The Third of the Moon on Monday the second Day of November, in the Afternoon, visible.

- IV. The Fourth of the Sun, on Monday November sixteenth Day, about half past ten o'Clock in the Evening ; a great Eclipse in some Parts of the World, tho' invisible to us. — This Eclipse happens in the eleventh Degree of the celestial *Scorpion*.

One Star differeth from another in glory. — The most glorious is the Planet VENUS ; and she will be Oriental, or our Morning Star from the beginning of this Year to the thirty fifth Day of May, about 2 o'Clock afternoon, when she will be in Conjunction with the Sun ; and from thence she will be Occidental or Evening Star to the End of the Year.

Of the benefit of mixing Soils in order to fertilize the Land. Clay pre or grad

In an extract of a Letter to a Friend.

I Have heretofore made experiments of this kind, and here I never knew them to fail in a single Instance. I took the here a hint from Bradley's treatise on *Husbandry and Gardening*, in quantiti which he gives an instance of two large fields (the one pure exami sand, and the other tough clay, that the owner set no man- ner of value on) being render'd more fruitful than any other fields in the same county, by no other means but mixing, which was, as near as I can recollect, done in the following man- ner. The owner constantly employ'd his teams, when they were not otherwise necessarily engaged, in carting clay to the sand field, and returning sand to the clay field, until he had covered each of them with earth from the other, about six inches deep, after that, the clay field was ploughed very deep, and turned over the sand which had been laid upon it, and lay exposed to the frost one whole winter, as was also the clay which had been laid upon the sand field; the frequent operation of the frost upon the clay slack'd it as much as lime is slack'd, by which means it was rendered capable of being mixed with the sand by repeated plough- ings, and thereby made fit for use. The land (before totally useless) for ten years successively, produced a crop of Wheat of full thirty bushels, without any manure. In this new country manure is very scarce, especially on new farms where but little stock can be kept. We abound in sandy lands especially in Plymouth county, and in some parts of the county of York; and in Plymouth county, there is scarcely a hundred acres together any where without some clay on, or near it, and since the experiment is so easy, and cer- tainly produces such good effects, it is well worth making.

Where farmers are weak handed as to teams, and cannot find means to come up to Mr. Bradley's rule, a smaller quan- tity should be applied: If, for instance, a farmer should chance to have a clay-pit near his sandy field, he should cart clay sufficient to cover the sand only two inches, even tho' he should carry it in a wheel-barrow, he would find more ac- count in it than from so much dung. I speak this from ex- perience. It would always be best to cart the clay in the fall, and lay it in small heaps properly distributed over the land; it would by this means, by frequent wets, heats and frosts, be often put into a state of fermentation, and render- ed fit to be spread over the land.—This sort of dressing has greatly the advantage of dung, in that its effects are more durable, and it produces no insects to devour your crop.

the Lord, clay prepared and applied as before, is also the best manure
for grass lands ; this I first discovered by observing that
and where a cart passed often with clay through my pasture,
there appeared a finer verdure, and a four-fold greater
quantity of grass, as I then judged after a particular
examination.

To kill RATS.

POUND some stone lime, and mix it with oat-meal and
course sugar ; lay it about the house, and set water by
it ; for after they eat of it they will drink till they burst, then
the rest will leave the place. Tho' this seems but a simple
thing, yet it will destroy them faster than any thing else, and
do no other damage.

A cure for Frost-bitten Feet.

Take the fat of a dung-hill fowl, and rub the place, or
places affected with it, morning and evening, over a warm
fire ; at the same time wrapping a piece of woollen cloth
well greased with the said fat, round the frost-bitten parts : in
two or three days they will feel no pain, and in five or six
days will be quite cured.

Note, If the inner bark of elder, or the leaves of plantain
are first simmered in said fat, it will be the better.
