Cotrell & Leonard to Shut Down

## Hearings Resume on Cap and Gown Labor Dispute

Hearings concerning unfair labor practices allegedly committed by Cotrell & Leonard, the company that until last year produced caps and gowns for Tufts commencement ceremonies, are scheduled to resume today in upstate New York after four days of preliminary hearings in August.

In addition to the increasing number of charges that are being raised against the company, the case has a new twist—Cotrell & Leonard is going out of business. As result of this development, settlement negotiations are now under way. A settlement is expected to be reached shortly, Al Norek of the National Labor Relations Board in Albany, N.Y. predicted. If, however, a settlement is not reached the court proceedings could take up to two years.

According to Norek, the hearings, which were originally scheduled to begin in May, were delayed until August because new allegations were raised against the company concerning their relations with the International Ladies Garment Workers Union. The I.L.G.W.U. is the union that represents the employees of Cotrell & Leonard.

According to Norek, an employer is obligated to bargain with the union and Cotrell & Leonard allegedly refused to do so.

As a result of the labor disputes, Cotrell & Leonard lost Tufts University Arts and Sciences business on

March 19 when a student/faculty committee voted seven to nothing with one abstention to acquire caps and gowns for the 1980 commencement ceremonies from an alternate source.

The labor disputes first became an issue on campus early in March when the I.L.G.W.U. sent a letter to President Jean Mayer charging the company with unfair labor practices.

The union, which had already been picketing the Cotrell & Leonard plant in Albany since August of 1979, charged the company with providing poor pay, inadequate working conditions and threatening its

The Cotrell and Leonard Company has denied committing any unfair labor practices and has maintained that its wage and benefits scale breaks no law.

## Tufts Victims Identify Assailants

The five Tufts victims who were assaulted last Wednesday night positively identified Michael P. Sheehan (18), Gordon F. Puopolo (17), Joseph L. Paolillo (18), and two juveniles of Somerville as the alleged attackers.

All five are charged with assault and battery with a dangerous weapon. "Once an attacker kicks

his victim," Detective Sergeant Foster, of the Tufts Police explained, "his shod foot is considered a dangerous weapon."

The five separate incidents happened around 8:00 p.m. Wednesday night at different points on campus: two in the parking lot between Carmichael and Wren; one in the Fletcher field; one in the rear of Wessell Library; and one on the south-west side of the library.

"Because of the statement of the suspects," Foster said, "we have reason to believe that there was a sixth assault on the quad near the construction. However, it went unreported," Foster said.

One victim who was badly injured is still at home in Rhode Island suffering from a severe concussion which has resulted in a memory loss. "This victim," Foster said, "has a memory loss which spans a two hour period, one hour before the assault and one hour after. He doesn't even remember where he was on campus. However, he remembers the attacker who kicked him so we have a positive identification."

## Letter to the Editor

### MassPIRG Responds

To the Editor:

In order to clarify what seemed to be a misunderstanding on the part of R. Michael Medwid in his letter to the editor of September 12, we would like to explain the present status of the Tufts chapter of MASSPIRG.

First of all, the chapter has not yet received any funds from the T.C.U. Senate. Last year's Student Activities Fee increase was based on the anticipated funding needs of student activities. The MASSPIRG allotment was included in the assessment, however, the Trustees approved only the increase, while this year's T.C.U. Senate must approve the final allocation of funds.

Unfortunately, the student referendum held in January '80, in which over 70% of the voting body favored the refundable system, is binding on neither the administration nor the trustees. We regret to inform the Tufts community that the administration's interpretation of the trustee's policy on the Student Activities Fee prevent PIRG from refunding those stu-

dents who do not wish to support the organization.

Although refunds are not acceptable to the powers that be, PIRG is still committed to student choice. PIRG is presently engaged in negotiations with the T.C.U. Senate to develop an alternative system that will provide students with an option should they decide not to support PIRG. Suggestions are welcome.

If a refundable system had been instituted, R. Michael Medwid would have avoided his frustration, because the guidelines included in the refundable proposal provided for two weeks of publicity regarding refund time and location. The details of any alternative system will be publicized once they are finalized.

We hope that this letter has resolved any questions that students may have concerning the PIRG status.

the dancers called out various maneuvers-- "jump", "skip", "leap", and "turn" --and danced accordingly. A rather conventional start transformed into a series of solo and ensemble variations upon this original theme, ending with the same.

The third piece, entitled Silkweed, was a solo performance by Ms. Faulkner. Keith Jarrett's Koln Concert was appropriately chosen as background music. Anyone familiar with Jarrett's music is aware of the emotionalism embodied within. Ms. Faulkner displays the same type of all-consuming emotion in her dancing. As a presence, she has the ability to appear seductive, pixie-ish, fluid, and athletic.

Crazy Paving was reminiscent of a Zenith television commercial - the Spandex body suits were vivid blue, vibrant orange, and vivacious rouge. The costumes, in combination with the Ramayana Monkey Chants, gave one the feeling that

the two dancers were playing out a hallucinogenic trip. Especially effective in this piece was the lighting which played up the writhing and wriggling of the dancers by counter-coloring the costumes.

The final work of the evening was Protowhorl, music again by Leo Kottke. The work was not nearly as visually stimulating as Crazy Paving, but it moved through some interesting variations upon the original Whorl. With the ensemble again dancing with Ms. Faulkner, it became evident that she has a nurturing influence on her students - one was especially fluid, whereas another was especially seductive, and yet all tried to emulate Ms. Faulkner's range of emotions. In general, all displayed a unique creativity, and their performances as individuals and as an ensemble were strong.
