ECLIPSES for 1794.

THERE will be six Eclipses this year, four of the Sun, and two of the Moon.

The first will be a solar Eclipse on the 31st of January, at 36ms. after 6 o'Clock, in the Morning, invisible to us.

The second will be a total eclipse of the Moon, the 14th day of February, latter part visible by calculation, as follows, viz.

Digits eclipsed 21s. 12 from the south side the Earth's shade.

The third will be of the Sun, on the first day of March, at 10 minutes after 5 o'clock, in the afternoon, invisible.

The fourth will also be a solar Eclipse, July 26, at 19 minutes after 5 o'clock, in the afternoon, invisible.

The fifth a visible and total Eclipse of the Moon, on the 11th of August, as follows, viz.

Digits Eclipsed 20s. 23' south side of the Earth's shadow.

The sixth will be a small Eclipse of the Sun, only about one third of a Digit, or 20 minutes of the Sun's Disk, will be obscured from us which is about one thirty sixth part of his breadth; it will happen the 25th of August, at 57 minutes after 5 o'clock in the morning. The whole duration will not exceed 20 minutes.



Concise CALANDAR for young Farmers and
GARDNERS.

JANUARY.

BUT little can be done this month in the fields and gardens, but remember that at the close of it, the snow may chance to melt away, therefore improve sledging to get your supply of wood for the summer. Visit your corn barns and granaries; see that rats, mice, &c. do not destroy your grain, &c. Cut timber if you wish it to last long, in the last quarter of the moon in this month.

FEBRUARY.

THIS month be sure to prune your fruit and other trees. If the snow is off the ground, and there should be a spell of moderate weather, the ground which you prepared for peas in October you may now sow. Now get your tools in order for spring work, while you have leisure.

MARCH.

As soon as the snow is off the ground, repair your stone walls, and mend your other fences, such work is generally neglected too long to the great detriment of the farmer, if you neglected your nurseries or fruit trees last month, be sure to visit them early this. It is best to watch the weather, and be prepared to begin your work, when it will permit, should the season be favourable at the end of this month, you may graft and inoculate trees—and set them out for an orchard; but it commonly does as well, if you have neglected setting out trees in the fall, to omit it until the beginning of April.

APRIL.

Now begin in good earnest to engage in your spring work. Be it your first care to get your seed for spring grain in the ground, sow flax seed as early as possible, if the season permits, get all your dung on the ground and your first ploughing completed—plant potatoes for early use about the middle of the month, you may now graft and inoculate fruit trees—set out orchards, be sure to be busy in your garden, look to your shrubbery, and roots of all kinds, turn the ground well up, that it may be light and fit for the reception of seeds of various kinds, sow lettuce, &c. uncover your asparagus beds, if neglected last month, and with a small hoe, or dung fork, loosen the earth round the roots, transplant them, &c.

M A Y.

This is a very busy month for Farmers and Gardeners. Plant corn, potatoes, beans, &c. Continue to sow peas — lettuce and sallading may now be planted for summer use, Plant rosemary, lavender, thyme, &c. Seeds of all kinds may now be put in the ground, observe, the best dung for gardens is untried earth, that is rich and mellow ground, taken about half a foot below the surface of rich new earth; This is the most beneficial manure to all plants. If you use horse or cows dung for your gardens, be sure to take that which is most rotted. New grafted trees ought constantly to be looked after. Hoe your first crop of turnips, and sow a second.

J U N E.

Weed your Indian corn; carrots should be weeded before the weeds overrun them, and thinned by hoeing, hot beds of beets, carrots, leeks, onions, parsley, parsnips, &c. Melons and cucumbers, attacked by black flies or spiders, must be fumigated with tobacco smoke, continue to plant beans, be careful to destroy all kinds of weeds before they run to seed, plant cucumbers at the latter end of this month for pickling, water often in dry weather, beds of seedlings, continue to sow radish seeds, pees, &c. Cabbages should be often hoed and earthed, nothing will make them flourish better; seek and destroy worms, slips, or cuttings of sage, rosemary, rue, lavender, southern wood, hyssop, thyme, &c. will now take tolerably well.

J U L Y.

You may now sow peas for the fall: also turnips, hill your Indian corn — Now for hay — attend to your grass, begin by mowing that which is ripest and thinnest, look after your bees, which in hot weather will swarm. Turn bulls to store heifers, get your sickles in order for reaping early rye, which will be fit for cutting the latter end of the month, lay up such herbs for drying as are now in blow.

A U G U S T.

Reap and mow all kinds of corn as it becomes ripe, pull and stack seed flax, if ripe, continue to gather seeds of various sorts as they ripen when the weather is dry, gather herbs for distilling and drying. Budding or inoculating generally succeeds best when it is performed in cloudy weather, or late in the afternoon, such trees that were grafted in the spring and miscarried, may now be budded

with any of the same sorts of fruit. If any of your fruit trees are blighted, apply some hog's dung immediately, digging it with a fork:

SEPTEMBER.

Look to your Indian corn, cut stalks, and take care to dry them well, for they are excellent fodder, get your cyder presses in order. Cucumbers for pickling should be finished gathering, gather early apples, sow wheat and rye, put your hogs up to fatten, look to your bees, and destroy drones, dig potatoes in dry weather and house them, get your barns in order to put up your cattle before cold weather comes on, take care of your flax that is rotting, that it is not overtaken by severe frosts and kept on the ground all winter.

OCTOBER.

No time in this month must be lost, gather in your Indian corn, prune and plant forest trees—clean out water courses, continue gathering in potatoes, now you may make cyder in earnest, be sure to have your Indian corn husked as soon as possible after it is gathered in heaps: You may now dung vacant land in your gardens, and dig and throw it in ridges, thrash out seeds that are well dried, and put them into bags.

NOVEMBER.

Put up your cattle in the barn, bleed your horses, move your bees under shelter, if neglected last month, continue to plant fruit and timber trees. Roots of beets, parsley, carrots, potatoes, parsnips, turnips, &c. take up in a dry day, early in this month to preserve for the use of winter; cut off the tops close, clean them from dirt, and deposit them in dry soil with the crowns of the roots downwards, over which you may throw some dry covering.

DECEMBER.

As very little can be done this month either in fields or gardens, break and dress your flax, kill your hogs and fat cattle, take care of young foals; look after your bees, and feed them if they need it, feed your pigeons; spread ashes among their dung, &c. Prepare a few useful books to instruct and amuse you, during long evenings. If thou hast been frugal and industrious through the year, it will afford you pleasing reflections; and the fruit of your labour will enable you to enjoy more happiness than otherwise in your social hours on winter evenings.—Farewell.
