

Tufts Tramples Trinity; Krueger Scores Four TD's

If the Tufts' football teams' first game of the season is any indication of things to come, then the remaining seven opponents had better get ready. On Saturday, the Jumbos opened their season at home against the Trinity Bantams, and left the field with a convincing 31-6 win.

Tufts made good ise of of all four Trinity turnover throughout the game, scoring at each opportunity. Four minutes into the opening quarter, a fumble recovery by Captain Tom Duffy set up the first Jumbo Touchdown. Duffy recovered the ball at the Tufts 48 yard line and the offensive unit took over. A Dave Piermarini pass to Bob Sameski gave the Jumbos a first and goal situation on the Trinity six. Two carries by fullback

Mike Krueger and a Mark Harasimowicz extra point made the score 7-0 in favor of the Jumbos.

Trinity could do nothing with its next possession, thanks to a tough defensive stand and fine kickoff that left the Bantams deep in their own territory.

A poor Trinity punt gave the Jumbos excellent field position at the Bantom 35 yard line. Sameski and Krueger were both called upon to cover the next 33 yards in six plays. On the seventh play of the drive, Krueger shot up the middle for his second TD of the quarter. Trinity's offense was completely thwarted by the tough Jumbo defense and Krueger was able to score once again before the half.

International Engineering A Possibility At Tufts

"Tufts has all the pieces to put together a program International Engineering," says Frederick Nelson, Dean of the College of Engineering. By combining the unique resources of Tufts, including the College of Engineering, the strong International Relations major and the existent engineering exchange program in France and England, Nelenvisions a possible twelve to fifteen students a year graduating in an international engineering program.

Presently, Tufts has engineering exchange programs with the Institut National des Sciences Appliquees in Lyon, France, and the University of Sussex, in England, with about eight students participating each year. "The idea for the international engineering program really came about five years ago, with the exchange program," said Nelson. But now, in addition to the year abroad, there would be required courses in several areas, possible including history, politics and economics, that would be taught through Fletcher, and hopefully, "a capstone course that would give the student a perspective and wrap-up of the country they studied in." In order to prepare for the year abroad, the first two years of the major would consist of engineering requirements, with the possibility of a language requirement. Nelson would also like an additional exchange program to a Spanish speaking country, possible in South America, but has made no specific plans.

"There is a big step we have yet to make in the move

from idea to actual program and that is the planning process," cautions Nelson. He would like to put together a planning committee from the Engineering College, Fletcher, Lyon, Sussex and the industry to "thrash around the whole idea of an international engineering program for two or three weeks and come up with a solid proposal." The program would then need to be endowed, so Nelson has been talking to possible corporate and alumni donors, but admits, "The economy is tough and corporate donations are not coming in."

According to Nelson, there is a limited but definite need for engineers with the kind of training the international éngineering program would offer, especially with multinational corporations. Through the program, students would become "much more sensitive and useful people, especially if working in a foreign country." Nelson added, "There are really not many opportunities for engineers to freelance -- it really is an employed profession, but the International Engineering major would definitely have more interesting options." For instance, the program in Lyon has exchanges with certain West African nations, and training an engineer to be able to help the needs of an underdeveloped country, or to help it enter the technologically orientated world, would be a unique aspect of the pro-

Nelson thinks the student body at Tufts would be receptive to this program and

Harasimowicz connected on both extra points to boost the score to 21-0 at the half.

The second half of the game was no different than the first — it was all Tufts. Ball possession during the first half of the third quarter was traded back and forth before the Jumbos put together their fourth scoring drive. An interception by linebacker Dan Mead gave the Jumbos excellent field position. After a Trinity

penalty and six consecutive carries, Mike Krueger scored his fourth touchdown of the game. The extra point was good again and Tufts upped the score to 28-0.

The Jumbos added three more points later in the fourth quarter on a 16 yard field goal by Harasimowicz. With 36 seconds remaining, Trinity scored its only touchdown of the game on a Mike Elia run. Trinity failed to connect on the two point conversion attempt that ended the game.

Mike Krueger ran for 80 yards and four TD's, while Sameski gained 54 yards, and halfback Lenny Barber added 14 yards. Starting quarterback Dave Piermarini weent 14 for 21 for a total of 114 yards, with no interceptions.

"We had great defensive help in the game, and the goal line offense pulled through. I was a bit worried about the heat but the players are in good shape and it didn't bother them. Mainly we played tough emotionaly" head coach Vic Gatto said after the victory.






