Apocalyptic mayhem, contingency plans, and gas masks have entered Medford and Somerville. As the first wave of the avian flu pandemic hits the twin city area, Tufts students are being ordered by the Federal Government to stay indoors under lock and key.

In the first confirmed case of avian flu to hit the continental United States, Tufts University will be closed until further notice, according to a direct order from the President's office.


"It was a waste of a fine pumpkin," he said.

After hearing the announcement that he was the highest-earning dead celebrity in the past year, deceased Nirvana frontman Kurt Cobain was in shock.




that kind of stick-it-to-The-Man attitude. Who needs acclaim? This movie gives him so much more street cred.

Everyone agrees Alex Rodriguez is clearly not on steroids

After a disappointing postseason and a down year statistically, fans and baseball insiders have begrudgingly accepted that New York Yankees third baseman Alex Rodriguez is not taking performance-enhancing substances.

"I really thought with his homerun pace that he had to be on steroids," said Peter Gammons, senior baseball writer for ESPN.com. "But [World Series MVP] David Eckstein played better against the Tigers than he did. Maybe we should investigate him instead."

In a decade where many of the league's best and brightest stars have been accused of using steroids or other drugs to improve their performances, it's no surprise that Rodriguez, a two-time American League MVP who has led the AL in homeruns in four of the past

six seasons would come under scrutiny. But in 2006, Rodriguez's production in homeruns, batting average, slugging percentage and runs batted in all dropped.

Rodriguez, the highest-paid player in the game, then followed up his sub-par regular season with an atrocious postseason. In the American League Divisional Series between the Yankees and the Detroit Tigers, Rodriguez went 1-for-14, striking out four times. Manager Joe Torre dropped him to the eighth spot for Game 4.

"I'm very happy that people have decided to stop accusing me of things I didn't do," Rodriguez said triumphantly in a press conference in New York last week. "I can say honestly that I didn't help this team win in 2006, didn't contribute against the Tigers, and definitely didn't take steroids."

Rodriguez also lacks the physical changes that performance-enhancing

drugs are known to cause. Whereas players like Mark McGwire and Jason Giambi possessed imposing physiques at the height of their drug abuse, Rodriguez is one of the more diminutive power hitters of his era.

"Have you seen my head?" Rodriguez said. "It's not nearly big enough for me to be taking steroids."

Many Yankees players, however, have shared a locker room with Rodriguez and have questioned the size of his testicles, leading to further steroid speculation.

For Yankees fans, the realization has been harder to take. Many of them were convinced the former shortstop, who has 464 career homeruns and is on pace to break Hank Aaron's career home run record, was using steroids.

"I've just gotten so used to blaming him and accusing him of everything, from the firing of Joe Girardi in Florida

to the flu that Rudy Giuliani was battling last week," said Arthur Martin of New Rochelle, N.Y. "But I guess we have to forgive him on this one. If he was on steroids, he might have produced."

"You saw the way he tried to cheat in 2004 against the Red Sox with that slap," said Vinny Mancini, a native of Hackensack, N.J. "Then again, he was slapping like a girl. Guys on steroids would have clothes-lined [Bronson] Arroyo."

However, the fan skepticism may have been an effect of the negative media attention heaped at Rodriguez, said Gammons.

"When you have Mike Lupica calling his mother a prostitute and Mike and the Mad Dog saying they heard he abused children, it's much easier to believe he took steroids," Gammons said. "The child abuse matter is still being looked into, but the steroid rumor is definitely false."

FITZGERALD AGREES TO RETURN PENDING 401(K) AGREEMENT

Fifth-year senior Brian Fitzgerald has agreed to return to the men's basketball team for the 2006-2007 season pending the results of current pension negotiations with the team.

"I'm really excited to play again, but I'm at a point in my life where I need to start thinking about the long haul," Fitzgerald said. "I love the boys, and I believe I owe Amherst a thorough ass-whooping, but I've got other things to consider right now, like financial security."

Fitzgerald has been meeting with coach Bob Sheldon and members of the athletics administration to work out the details and find a loophole to get around Div. III restrictions against any financial compensation for play.
