IN RECENT YEARS ... WE HAVE USED OUR ANNUAL MEETING ... TO REPORT ON OUR SITUATION ... OUR CHALLENGES. THAT WILL BE THE CASE TODAY.

YOU WILL FIND IT FAIRLY
DETAILED ... AND SO WE HAVE
PREPARED A WRITTEN SUMMARY
FOR YOUR USE. WE HOPE YOU
FIND IT THOUGHT-PROVOKING.

AT OUR WINTER MEETING IN FEBRUARY ... WE WILL TALK ABOUT PROGRAMS TO DEAL WITH THESE CHALLENGES.

(pause)

THE TOBACCO INSTITUTE FACES FIVE BROAD ... OVER-RIDING CHALLENGES.

CHALLENGE NUMBER ONE ... IS
DEALING WITH THE CURRENT
ANTI-SMOKER AGENDA ... THE
LARGE AND GROWING VOLUME OF
PUBLIC SMOKING MEASURES ...
EXCISES ... ADVERTISING AND
PROMOTION RESTRICTIONS ...
BEING CONSIDERED AT ALL
LEVELS OF GOVERNMENT.

IN 1981 ... WE FACED 232

STATE LEGISLATIVE PROPOSALS

AND DEFEATED OR POSTPONED 87

PER CENT OF THEM.

BY 1985 ... THE VOLUME HAD JUMPED TO NEARLY 540 ... 130 PER CENT MORE THAN WE FACED IN 1981.

STILL ... WITH A SMALLER
STATE ACTIVITIES STAFF ...
WE MANAGED TO WIN OR
POSTPONE BETTER THAN EIGHT
OUT OF EVERY TEN MEASURES.

THIS YEAR ... THE VOLUME INCREASED SLIGHTLY ... BUT OUR RECORD WAS THE BEST OF THE DECADE ... 88 PER CENT WERE DEFEATED OR POSTPONED.

IF WE WERE TO ASSUME JUST A
10 PER CENT ANNUAL INCREASE
IN THE VOLUME OF THESE BASIC
... ANTI-SMOKING MEASURES
... WE WILL SEE 820 BILLS A
YEAR BY THE END OF THIS
DECADE ... A 250 PER CENT
JUMP IN TEN YEARS.

AND ... MAY I REMIND YOU ... I AM SPEAKING JUST ABOUT STATE ... NOT FEDERAL OR LOCAL ... ACTIVITY.

AT THE MUNICIPAL LEVEL ...
WE HAVE SEEN A 126 PER CENT
INCREASE IN ORDINANCES SINCE
1981 ... AND, FRANKLY, WE
HAVE HAD TROUBLE STOPPING
THEM.

OUR BEST RECENT YEAR WAS 1984 ... WHEN WE STOPPED 63 PER CENT.

THIS YEAR ... WITH 275 LOCAL ORDINANCES ON OUR PLATTER ... WE EXPECT TO WIN OR POSTPONE ABOUT 60 PER CENT.

ONE THINKS OF NEW YORK AND CHICAGO IN THIS CATEGORY BUT THE TRUTH OF THE MATTER IS THAT WE MUST MONITOR ORDINANCES IN NEARLY 24,000 MUNICIPALITIES AND COUNTIES ... 90 PER CENT OF WHICH HAVE POPULATIONS OF 25,000 OR LESS.

THE SHEER NUMBERS MAKE IT VERY TOUGH.

(pause)

THE FEDERAL SITUATION ALSO HAS SEEN AN EXPLOSION OF ANTI-INDUSTRY ACTIVITY.

BETWEEN THE 97TH AND 99TH CONGRESSES ... THE VOLUME OF BILLS INTRODUCED INCREASED 168 PER CENT ... TO THE CURRENT LEVEL OF 161.

IN THE 99TH ... ABOUT 70 OF THOSE BILLS WERE ON OUR PRIORITY LIST.

BUT ANTI-TOBACCO BILL "INTRODUCTIONS" ARE JUST PART OF THE STORY.

THERE HAVE BEEN YEARS WITH.
50 BILLS INTRODUCED ... BUT
LITTLE COMMITTEE OR FLOOR
ACTION.

NOT SO ... THESE PAST SIX YEARS.

THE 97TH CONGRESS WAS
DIFFICULT ... OUT OF IT CAME
OUR FIRST FEDERAL TAX
INCREASE IN NEARLY 30 YEARS.

THE 98TH WAS SOMEWHAT TOUGHER ... WITH ITS LABELING LEGISLATION AND FIRE SAFE CIGARETTE STUDY.

BUT THE 99TH WAS THE TOUGHEST OF THE THREE.

ALTHOUGH WE LOST FEW ... OUR BATTLES WERE FAR MORE INTENSE THAN IN PREVIOUS YEARS.

IN THE 97TH CONGRESS ... 28
SENATORS SPONSORED OR
CO-SPONSORED BILLS. IN THIS
PAST CONGRESS ... MORE THAN
90 DID SO ... A 221 PER CENT
INCREASE.

IN THE 97TH ... WE NEEDED TO LOBBY SOME 300 MEMBERS OF KEY COMMITTEES ... BY THE 99TH ... THE NUMBER ROSE 56 PER CENT.

IN THE 99TH ... WE FACED 18
DAYS OF HEARINGS ...
FEATURING 275 WITNESSES ...
ON 13 SUBJECTS. THAT WAS
ALMOST DOUBLE WHAT WE SAW
SIX YEARS EARLIER.

AS BOB LEWIS WILL REPORT ...
THE 100TH CONGRESS WILL BE
TOUGHER YET.

THERE IS NO QUESTION OF PRIORITIES ... OUR FIRST CHALLENGE IS TO DEAL WITH THE BASIC, ANTI-SMOKER AGENDA ... THE LITERALLY HUNDREDS OF BILLS AND ORDINANCES AT ALL LEVELS OF GOVERNMENT.

OUR SECOND CHALLENGE IS POSED BY REGULATION.

IN 1970 ... 16 FEDERAL AGENCIES TOOK AN INTEREST IN TOBACCO.

THEY RANGED FROM THE SURGEON GENERAL AND FEDERAL TRADE COMMISSION TO THE VETERANS ADMINISTRATION AND ITS INFAMOUS "SMOKING BEAGLE" STUDY.

BY 1980 ... THE NUMBER OF AGENCIES INVOLVED WITH US HAD INCREASED TO 23.

THE ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION
AGENCY ... CIVIL AERONAUTICS
BOARD ... AND DEFENSE
DEPARTMENT ... AMONG OTHERS
... JOINED THE BATTLE.

THIS PAST YEAR ... THE
NUMBER ROSE TO 33 ... A 43
PER CENT INCREASE DURING THE
FIRST SIX YEARS OF AN
ADMINISTRATION SUPPOSEDLY
PLEDGED TO DEREGULATION.

NOT ALL OF IT IS BAD ... THE U.S. TRADE REPRESENTATIVE SERVED OUR INDUSTRY WELL.

BUT ... EACH ONE OF THOSE AGENCIES REQUIRES CONSTANT ATTENTION ... NOT ONLY FROM LOBBYISTS ... BUT OFTEN FROM HIGHLY-SPECIALIZED TECHNICAL CONSULTANTS AS WELL.

AT THE STATE LEVEL, WE HAVE SEEN RELATIVELY LITTLE REGULATION ... BUT THE NEW YORK PUBLIC HEALTH COUNCIL AND THE MASSACHUSETTS BAY TRANSIT AUTHORITY POSED SERIOUS PROBLEMS FOR US THIS YEAR.

CHALLENGE NUMBER THREE ...
NEW ANTI-SMOKING INITIATIVES

TWO YEARS AGO ... PRODUCT ... LIABILITY LEGISLATION WAS DEBATED MORE BY COLLEGE PROFESSORS THAN BY MEMBERS OF STATE LEGISLATURES.

ONE YEAR AGO TODAY ... WE FIRST READ THAT THE A.M.A. HAD PROPOSED A BAN ON CIGARETTE ADVERTISING.

A YEAR AGO ... NO ONE
THOUGHT THE MILITARY WOULD
EVER CONSIDER PROGRAMS TO
DISCOURAGE SMOKING ... MUCH
LESS TO BAN THE SALE OF
CIGARETTES IN COMMISSARIES.

LAST MONTH ... IN DEL MAR,
CALIFORNIA ... A CITY
COUNCILMAN PROPOSED A BAN ON
SMOKING IN ALL
PUBLICLY-FUNDED PLACES ...
INCLUDING SIDEWALKS, PARKS
AND FREEWAYS.

IN NOVEMBER OF 1981 ... THE NATIONAL CONFERENCE ON SMOKING OR HEALTH PUBLISHED ITS NOW FAMOUS BLUEPRINT FOR ACTION ... A LIST OF ABOUT ONE HUNDRED ANTI-SMOKING INITIATIVES.

WORKPLACE SMOKING BILLS ...
EXCESSIVE TAXATION ...
LABELING ...
"SELF-EXTINGUISHING
CIGARETTE" MEASURES ...
"QUIT SMOKING" EFFORTS AIMED
AT WOMEN, MINORITIES AND
YOUNGSTERS ... ALL WERE
OUTLINED IN THE BLUEPRINT.

AT THE TIME ... MANY OF
THEIR IDEAS SEEMED
FAR-FETCHED ... BUT WE TAKE
EACH ONE SERIOUSLY.

NEXT YEAR ... IF THE
ANTI-SMOKERS STICK TO THEIR
GAME PLAN ... WE MAY SEE
BILLS CALLING FOR CHANGES TO
CIGARETTE INGREDIENTS AND
DESIGN ... MEASURES
FORBIDDING ASH TRAYS AS
STANDARD EQUIPMENT IN CARS
... AND LAWS REQUIRING BLOOD
AND URINE SAMPLES FROM
SUSPECTED SMOKERS.

AND ... IF IT WEREN'T FOR
BOB TISCH ... I WOULD WORRY
ABOUT SEEING OUR FIRST
ANTI-TOBACCO POSTAGE STAMP.
THAT'S IN THE BLUEPRINT AS
WELL.

(pause)

CHALLENGES ONE ... TWO ...
AND THREE DESCRIBE THE
BATTLES WE FACE.

CHALLENGES FOUR AND FIVE ....
DEAL WITH OUR ABILITY TO
FIGHT THOSE BATTLES.

NUMBER FOUR ... IS THE MAINTENANCE OF OUR MOST IMPORTANT COALITION ... OUR FIRST AND LAST LINE OF DEFENSE ... THE TOBACCO FAMILY.

WHEN WE PULL TOGETHER ... WE ARE TOUGH TO BEAT.

AS AN INSTITUTE ... WE ARE MORE UNITED THAN MOST TRADE GROUPS.

IN RECENT YEARS ... WE HAVE ... WORKED WELL WITH THE LABOR UNIONS SERVING OUR INDUSTRY.

OUR RELATIONS WITH THE N.A.T.D. HAVE A WAY TO GO ... BUT ARE MUCH IMPROVED THANKS TO NICK KARAKAS, THEIR CHAIRMAN.

THE NATIONAL TOBACCO COUNCIL SHOWS EVERY INDICATION OF WANTING TO BE MORE HELPFUL NEXT YEAR ... AND THE ADVERTISING AND PUBLISHING INDUSTRIES HAVE BEGUN TO PULL THEIR WEIGHT.

BUT ... WE RECEIVE MORE
POLITICAL HELP FROM PUBLIC
EMPLOYEES IN CALIFORNIA

THAN FROM GROCERY CHAINS THAT MAKE A SIGNIFICANT PROFIT FROM TOBACCO.

WE HAVE A BETTER WORKING
RELATIONSHIP WITH THE
VETERANS OF FOREIGN WARS ...
THAN THE PEOPLE WHO SELL YOU
PACKAGING MATERIALS.

WE HAVE SEEN STATE
WHOLESALERS SUPPORT EXCISE
TAX INCREASES ... AND WE
HAVE SEEN GROWERS BACK
EARMARKING.

THE CONVENIENCE STORE PEOPLE HAVE TOLD US THAT THE BATTLES ARE OVER ... THAT WE ARE A DYING INDUSTRY. THAT IS AN IGNORANT ... DANGEROUS ... ATTITUDE FROM A GROUP THAT RECEIVES 15 PER CENT OF ITS SALES AND 17 PER CENT OF ITS PROFITS FROM TOBACCO.

FOR THE MOST PART ... OUR INDUSTRY IS NOT WORKING AS COOPERATIVELY OR EFFECTIVELY AS WE MUST ... IF WE ARE TO CONTINUE WINNING NINE OUT OF TEN BATTLES.

GENTLEMEN ... OF OUR FIVE
CHALLENGES ... THIS MAY BE
THE MOST IMPORTANT ... OVER
THE LONG HAUL ... AND ONE
THAT WILL REQUIRE MUCH
ATTENTION FROM ALL OF US.

(pause)

OUR FIFTH AND FINAL
CHALLENGE IS THE MANAGEMENT
AND COST OF THE INSTITUTE
... AND THE TEAM WE HAVE
ASSEMBLED.

AT ONE POINT, WE CONSIDERED CONDUCTING A COST-BENEFIT STUDY OF THE INSTITUTE ... FOR TODAY'S MEETING.

WE QUICKLY REALIZED THE DIFFICULTY OF SUCH AN EXERCISE ... AND THE FACT THAT A SINGLE TAX BILL ... DELAYED ONE YEAR ... MAY HAVE A FINANCIAL IMPACT EQUAL TO THE COST OF TEN INSTITUTES.

THE FACT REMAINS ... WE ARE NOT AN INEXPENSIVE OPERATION. AS MANAGERS ... WE HAVE AN OBLIGATION TO JUSTIFY EACH DOLLAR OF THAT EXPENSE. WE TAKE THAT OBLIGATION SERIOUSLY.

FROM 1982 THROUGH 1985 ...
THE INSTITUTE'S ACTUAL
EXPENDITURES INCREASED 21
PER CENT. UNTIL 1985 ... WE
OPERATED UNDER BUDGET YEAR
AFTER YEAR.

IN 1985 ... FOR THE FIRST
TIME IN OUR HISTORY ... WE
WENT OVER BUDGET. THIS YEAR
... WE WILL BE OVER AGAIN.

THERE ARE TWO REASONS.

ONE REASON IS THE VOLUME ...
THE VARIETY ... THE
IMPORTANCE OF OUR WORK.

WE FOUGHT NEARLY 1,000
ANTI-TOBACCO MEASURES THIS
YEAR ... AND WE FOUGHT TO
WIN.

THE SECOND REASON IS A MORE TIGHTLY DEFINED BUDGET ...
AND OUR ATTEMPT TO ENTER EACH YEAR AS LEAN AS POSSIBLE.

CONTAINING COSTS WITHOUT SACRIFICING QUALITY ... IS INCREASINGLY DIFFICULT.

THE OTHER HALF OF THIS
CHALLENGE ... IS MAINTAINING
AND STRENGTHENING THE FINE
TEAM WE HAVE ASSEMBLED.

THE INSTITUTE HAS UNDERGONE MUCH CHANGE SINCE 1980. WE HAVE REALIGNED DEPARTMENTS ... REDEFINED RESPONSIBILITIES ... AND CHANGED REPORTING RELATIONSHIPS ...

WE HAVE FEWER STAFF ... 130 IN 1982 ... VERSUS 114 TODAY.

OUR TURNOVER HAS BEEN
SLIGHTLY HIGHER THAN OTHER
... SIMILAR ... TRADE
ASSOCIATIONS IN WASHINGTON.
THAT IS BECAUSE WE HAVE MADE
A CONCERTED EFFORT TO REFINE
OUR OPERATION.

I BELIEVE WE ARE MORE
TALENTED ... BETTER MANAGED
... AND MORE PRODUCTIVE THAN
AT ANY TIME IN THE PAST.
OUR WIN-LOSS RECORD SPEAKS
FOR ITSELF.

THE PEOPLE WE MOST WANT TO KEEP ARE DRAWN TO THE CHALLENGES ... AND TO THE SUPPORT WE RECEIVE FROM YOU.

WE HAVE PROMOTED 19 OF THE 44 PROFESSIONAL STAFF MEMBERS WITH US TODAY ... AN ACTION WE BELIEVE WILL PROLONG THE RIGHT CAREERS ... AND MOTIVATE OTHERS.

BE ASSURED ... THESE ARE CHALLENGES ... NOT PROBLEMS. THERE IS A DIFFERENCE.

A CHALLENGE IS SOMETHING UNDER CONTROL ... A PROBLEM IS YET TO BE TACKLED.

YOUR GUIDANCE ... FINANCIAL SUPPORT ... INVOLVEMENT AND FRIENDSHIP ARE AMONG THE INGREDIENTS WHICH MAKE FOR SOLUTIONS TO OUR CHALLENGES.
