Camp Tufts Opens Saturday

Tomorrow Tufts becomes the state's biggest playground as grade-school students from the Medford-Somerville area come on campus to participate in the Leonard Carmichael Society's yearly "kid's Day." An expected 2000 children of the ages 5-12 will enjoy a day of rides, games, and special events throughout campus.

The Fletcher field will feature a carnival and many other activities and games throughout the day. The rides will also be open to the campus Friday and Saturday nights. Up on the Carmichael Quad the kids will enjoy hay rides, gymnastics, juggling and musical performances. At noon the Tufts Mountain Club will climb Barnum Hall in a special demonstration of their skills. Inside Barnum (in 008) the film "Jungle Book" will be shown at 10:30am and 1:30pm. Many other events are also planned.

The youngsters will be led to the day's events by over 200 student volun-

teers. Many groups have been involved in the extensive planning, including the Crafts House, TEAC, and Chi Omega. "Kid's Day" is one of the few opportunities for Tufts students to enjoy a day of fun with local residents. Past "Kid's Days" have been a great success, and tomorrow (or Sunday in case of rain) should prove no exception.

Of special interest is that the Tufts Sign Language Club will be helping deaf children enjoy the carnival.

The children will register for the event at Jackson Gym beginning at 8:30, where they will be checked for permission slips, get name identification stickers, and meet their student group leaders. Expert Lectures on World Hunger

"The root cause of hunger in the world is not lack of food, but a lack of purchasing power for the majority of people in need of food," according to Elizabeth Anne Donnelly, a staff worker on the Presidential Commission on World Hunger who spoke to Tufts students Wednesday afternoon.

This analysis of world hunger in addition to policy suggestions aimed at correcting the uneven distribution of food will be included in the commission's formal report to the President, which will appear in print in about a week, Donnelly said. President Jean Mayer is currently the acting chair-

New Senate Elects Executive Board

At the Senate officer elections late Wednesday night, Phil Swain was elected chairman, Mara Glickman Vice-chairperson, and Pedro Williams won the treasurer spot. Rounding out the Swain administration for next year will be Jane Mermelstein as Secretary and Seth Godin as Parliamentarian.

Pedro Williams narrowly defeated Kevin Thurm for the Treasurer spot by a 17-15 margin. The secret-ballot vote of the 32 man Senate was tied after 30 votes. The final two votes were both for Williams, giving him the necessary majority.

Williams emphasized a "personality problem" of

Emphasizing student advocacy as the major role of the Senate, Swain proposed the placement of a student representative on the Board of Trustees as well as having mandatory office hours for each Senator. He also called for "roving meetings" that would bring the Senate to a different dorm each week.

Swain's qualifications include chairing the Subcommittee on Administrative Reviews, which forced the resignation last year of the former Dean of Students Tim Winant. During his three years on the Senate, Swain has been a troubleshooter for campus overcrowding, tuition increases and inadequate women's facilities. He describes himself as a "good listener," and added that the Senate "has got to stick our necks out for the

the Senate saying that too many organizations feel they are "begging the Senate for money" during the budgeting process. Williams has seen all sides of the budgeting process as the Chairman of the Finance Committee for the Afro-American Society, Treasurer of the Sign Language Club, in addition to his major role on the Senate Finance Committee.

Mara Glickman, most noted for her efforts this year on the Major/Minor proposal, said that choosing a replacement for Dean Harleston will be her top priority as Senate Vice-Chairperson next year. And Seth Godin pointed out the need to revamp the Senate Constitution to avoid many of the procedural pitfalls encountered during the Cambodian relief and MassPirg issues.

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Letter to the Editor

To the Editor:

I would like to respond to a letter written by CSL Chairman Donald W. Klein (*Tufts Daily*, 4/10/80) in which Professor Klein stated that he believes he "speaks for (his) CSL colleagues" by saying that the CSL "doesn't care about the person's character, background or past record" in dealing with fire-related matters.

Speaking for myself, I would like to take exception to the Chairman's summarization of the attitude and goals of the CSL: First, I believe that-- in life-safety violation cases before the CSL--the primary concern of the CSL should be the safety of students and protection of University property. By maintaining a tough stance of removing violators of safety rules from housing, the CSL prevents further violations by the same person and deters future violations by others. However, the use of housing expulsion as a punishment assumes that a person who violates University rules once will be compelled to

violate rules a second time; I believe that this assumption should be reconsidered on a case by case basis--including consideration of a person's character, background, or past record.

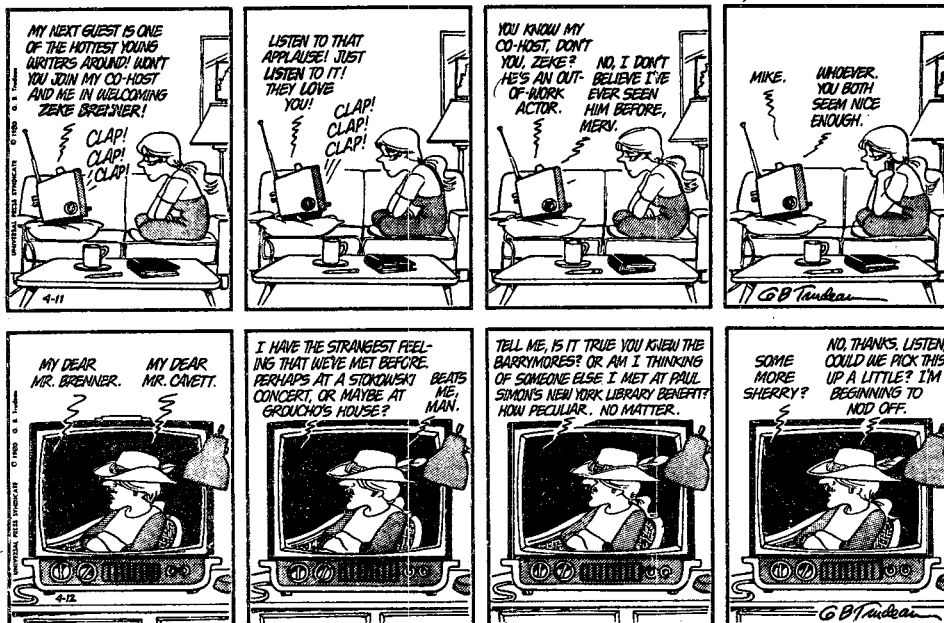
Second, concerning the deterrent effect of housing expulsion: there are other punishments of equal severity available to the CSL that would serve to deter future violators equally well; these alternative punishments should be put into greater use. The CSL must learn to square the safety of University students with the primary purpose of college education. By implementing punishments that disrupt the education of otherwise model students, the CSL is seriously upsetting the educational process.

Simply because a particular policy has been followed in the past, one cannot assume that that policy is the only correct path to follow in the future.
